### THE BIOLOGICAL BOARD OF CANADA

In another column we publish an article on the subject of shad hatching which later on may become a matter of importance to the people of The Valley. The article is furnished by Dr. A. P. Knight, Chairman of the Biological Board of Canada, which is the scientific division of the Fisheries Department at Ottawa. The Board is composed of representatives of nine of the leading Universities of Canada: Dalhousie, St. Francis Xavier, Laval, New Brunswick, McGill, Queen's, Toronto, Manitoba, British Columbia, together with five who are appointed by the Minister of Marine and Fisheries. The chief duty of this board is to advise the Fisheries Department on all problems which perplex the fish dealers or fishermen. At present five of the Board's scientists are at work in the new biological station at Halifax studying better methods of smoking fish, dressing fish, freezing fish, drying, etc. Not that these processes are not carried on now, but progressive fish dealers are always on the lookout for improvements and indeed very decided improvement has recently been made in smoked fish giving a better quality of smoked fish in half the time.

### THE BAPTIST ASSOCIATION

The Nova Scotia Western Baptist Association representing the counties of Annapolis, Digby and Lunenburg, met at the Digby Baptist Church, June 18-21, with about one hundred and thirty Pastors and Delegates present.

The first session was held on Thursday evening, the Moderator, Rev. W. D. Wilson, of Middleton, presiding. He introduced Rev. H. R. Grant, D. D., Secretary of the Nova Scotia Social Service Council as the speaker. Dr. Grant addressed the Association on the subject of Law Enforcement. He emphasized the enforcement of such laws as we now have covering Temperance Legislation, Gambling and Sunday Observance. The address was followed by an interesting discussion.

Friday morning's session was taken up with the routine of business and the reading of reports. An address of welcome was extended to the delegates by the pastor of the entertaining church, Rev. L. E. Nunns, and by His Worship Mayor Anderson, of Digby. Rev. P. R. Hayden of Bridgetown, fittingly responded.

In the filling of offices for the ensuing year, Rev. A. Gibson, of Annapolis Royal was elected Moderator; Rev. H. E. DeWolfe, New Germany, Vice Moderator; Rev. P. H. Eaton, Bridgewater, re-elected, Clerk and Lic. H. S. Martin, Hillsburn, Assistant Clerk.

Nine new pastors who have entered the Association during the year were welcomed by the Moderator.

The Digest of Letters and report on the state of the Denomination was presented by the Clerk and showed a total of 68 churches within the Association with a membership of 8,550 with about 25 per cent non-resident.

The afternoon session was devoted to the reading of Home and Western Mission Reports. The Home Mission Report stated that more churches than ever before were receiving pastoral care. Total additions to the Home Mission Churches during the year were about 300.

At the evening session, Rev. B. D. Knott, representing the Board of Pious and Finance gave a strong and inspiring address on the need of greater co-operation between the churches characterized by fellowship. ### SHAD HATCHING

One of the scientists of the Biological Board of Canada, is again working upon the Shad. This is the fifth year of his labor. How many more will be prosecuted his studies will depend upon the success which he meets with this season on the Annapolis River. His four previous summers were on the Shubenacadie and have enabled him to prove that the corp of shad in any year depends to a large extent upon the season. If the spring is cold and late and the waters of our rivers late in warming up, fewer shad fry may be expected to hatch out in the cold water and a smaller "crop" of adult fish may be expected four years hence. But, if the parent shad are late in coming into our rivers and spawn in the warmer brackish water near the river's mouth, more of the fry will hatch out in such warm brackish water and four years hence there will be a bigger "crop" for the fishermen.

Dr. Lein, who has been working upon this natural method of increasing the shad supply, is content that good results may be attained in this way. The only other way of increasing the propagation is to do as the Fisheries Department at Ottawa did four or five years ago, namely, stop all fishing for a period of years. Man is a destructive brute when he goes after any animal. Sooner or later the animal is almost exterminated. Forty years ago the Atlantic salmon were nearly depleted by salmure regulations. Similarly, if the fishermen want more shad, they can get them on two conditions: 1, by shortening the shad fishing season, and 2, by hatching the eggs in warm brackish water.
