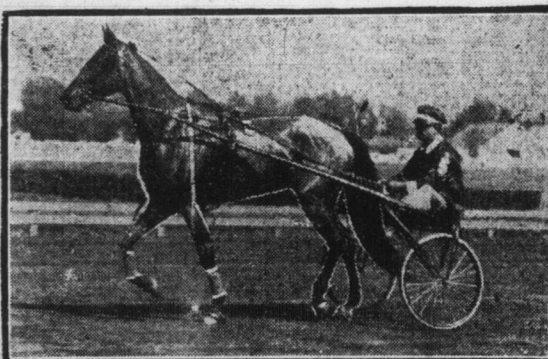
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SPORTING NEWS BRIEFLETS

Beavers Make Fine Impression in Opening Game

Detroit Stars Defeat Locals By Score of 4 to 1.
The Game in Detail.

Kitchener and Waterloo fans were given an opportunity yesterday of getting a line on this city's representatives in the M.-O. League and, while the visiting Detroit and Cuban Stars had the long end of a 4 to 1 score, Beatty's aggregation was by no means disgraced. It was a case of a real live bunch of ball tossers in the pink of condition against a nine that have been hampered by unfavorable weather during the training season but when the Beavers have a little conditioning and play more together they will be a hard team to beat. The weather was not altogether ideal for baseball there being a strong wind blowing but at that the locals hit the pill hard and often the only difficulty being to play it safe.

Manager Beatty sent Wilogal to the mound and for six innings this same southpaw pleased the 600 or more fans by his grand delivery. It is true he was touched up quite frequently but this was to be expected, considering the calibre of the visitors who have a reputation for tall slugging. He was relieved in the seventh by Leak who will be heard from before the season is far advanced. The line-up of the Beavers looks formidable. Batting seems to be their weak point but this will all be rectified when the team strike their gait. Manager Beatty is a hard worker, he keeps his men on the jump all the time and he and his team mates will be given hearty support the balance of the season.

WILLARD VERY CONFIDENT Discussion of Dempsey Fight begun

—Short Bout Robs go of much of Glamor.
New York May 7.—The Willard-Dempsey heavy-weight championship bout scheduled for July 4, at Toledo, O., was the one topic of discussion among eastern fight followers during the past 24 hours. While there is evidence of a wide difference of opinion regarding the outcome there

is no record of waging at this time. In fact those who take more than a passing interest in ring affairs find it difficult to reconcile the idea of a heavy-weight championship battle with the twelve-round contest which it is proposed to stage on the shores of Lake Erie.
The glamor which surrounded the virtual fight-to-a-finish in which Sullivan Corbett, Fitzsimmons, Jeffries and appears to be looking in this contest. It is also a decided ring novelty for a heavy weight champion to agree to place his title in jeopardy by a referee's decision over such a short route. Many expressed the opinion that it showed remarkable confidence on the part of Willard to successfully defend his title against such formidable an opponent as Jack Dempsey.

With the exception of the ten-round no-decision bout between Willard and Frank Moran in this city three years ago which few ring experts took seriously from a title-passing angle there is no record of such a short scheduled battle in the modern history of heavyweight fighting.

FEDERAL IN WITH MU

PROPOSES TO OVERRID AGREEMENTS

(Special to The Record)

TORONTO, May 9.—"It is an instance of the federal government interfering with provincial and municipal rights," said Sir Adam B. when asked his opinion on the act of the Railway Committee of federal house, which proposes to the Railway Board power to override agreements regarding rates of freight between municipalities and way companies holding Dominion charters.

"This will nullify all agreement to rates existing between municipalities and the federal government."

REGINA, VISITED BY IND. RELS. COM' FOUND RADIC.

INDOURED O-B.U. PROPO

REGINA, Sask., May 9. (By 2 Johnson).—Although Regina is an administrative and industrial city, rather than industrial city, workers who are here, are to judge evidence submitted to the Industrial Relations Commission, radical in views. They showed hostility to cooperation with capital, as strong not stronger than in Calgary, different from the average attitude of Edmonton and Saskatoon. Their views almost resemble those expressed at the Coast, although in fact, conditions here are infinitely better. They also rather suspect ulterior motives in the inquiry.

The company is inaugurating a plan of cooperation and benevolence as it is doing in the East. A vote will now be taken by Trades and Labor Council on a general strike. At a meeting last week, the trades and labor council by an overwhelming majority, decided in favor of the one-day strike, as trusted with the present international system.

Except for the striking carpenters there seems to be little unemployment less than anywhere else visited by commission up to date. T. M. Mul provincial labor commissioner for Saskatchewan, gave figures, for the province, showing that at the end of April, 1,000 people who had no employment were registered at his office. These he said were people who have a particular kind of work. In cases of unemployment there was 1 for about 1,500 workers.

Regina yesterday appeared cheerful than any other western city. People are well dressed, and was aboard an air of light heartedness.
