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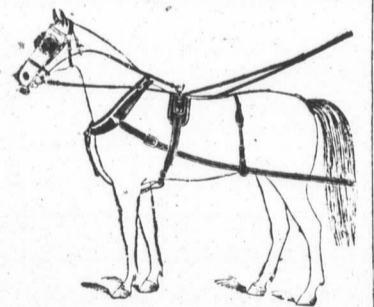

Morton of Croton-on-Hudson, N. Y. The bridegroom's father, who was a prominent and wealthy resident of the little burg of Croton, became ill, and in response to a request to the Peekskill, N. Y. Training School for a nurse, Miss Randolph was sent to him; Mr. Morton later died, but in meantime Miss Randolph had made the acquaintance of the son. An engagement followed, but only the family and a few friends knew of it. Miss Randolph returned to the school and remained there until the wedding day.

Major J. M. Walsh, a prominent resident of Brockville, died at his home there Tuesday morning, of last week, after an illness of about one week of heart trouble. The deceased was a native of Prescott, having been born there 63 years ago. He had been very active in military affairs nearly all his life. He served in the Fenian raids of 1866 and 1870, and during the Northwest rebellion he had charge of a detachment which was made famous by the building of Fort Walsh and the surrender of Sitting Bull, the latter being brought about by Major Walsh himself. In 1892 he was appointed the first administrator of the Yukon Territory. He established the Dominion coal, coke and transportation company, which contributed largely to the opening up of the coal fields of the Sonris district. Since his retirement from the Yukon Commissionership he has resided continuously in Brockville. The demise of Major Walsh has created profound sorrow throughout this district. He was of an affable and charitable disposition and was held in very high esteem by everyone.
