In reply I beg to say that the Indian Ast does not specifically deal with the matter of the adoption of children. The Indians are in the same position as white people in a matter of this kind.

The position which you have taken in your letter appears to be quite regular, and the Department can only suggest that if hing refuses to complete this matter only suggest that if hing refuses to complete this matter by giving the certificate of adoption or other such paper of adoption, as may be necessary, the child should be reconstructed to him. If the adoption is completed and the documents themse to him. If the adoption is completed and the documents filed with the Department, the certificate of adoption should sake it plain that the child's share of the band property is to go to the foster father.
