2. The space of this calculation occupies from ten at night till two next morning.

3. The nearer to mid-day or noon the phases of the Moon happen, the more foul or wet weather may be expected during the next seven days.

4. The space of the calculation occupies from ten in the forence to two in the after-soon. These observations refer principally to the Summer, though they affect Spring and Autumn nearly in the same ratio.

5 The Moon's change, first quarter, full, and last quarter, happening during six as as a sternoon hours, i.e., from four to ten, may be followed by fair weather.

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
