become its Prefident,) the petitioners have at a confiderable expense converted the Theatre into a temporary School, capable of containing eight hundred Children, in which three hundred and eighty-five have been received, and are educated in reading, writing and arithmetic, and the Girls in the ufeful arts belides of needle work, and the Scholars are rapidly increasing, and of the numbers in the School, thirty-feven are Black Children. That in the Buildings neceffary to fit up the School, and in the Purchase of Slates, &c. the petitioners have expended nearly eight hundred pounds, and have engaged a Mafter to superintend at an annual Salary of two hundred pounds, and a Miftrels at fifty pounds. That it is calculated that the annual expense requisite to keep up the Establishment, cannot be less than four handred pounds, including the Salary of the Matter and Miftrefs, purchase of Fuel, of Books, &c. and incidental repairs to the Building. That for further and fuller information respecting the nature and object of the Institution, the petitioners beg leave to refer the Members of this Honorable Houfe to a view of the School, which is at all times open for the infpection of those who may be pleafed to honor it with their vifits, and to whom it may be more circumstantially explained by Wolter Bromley, Elq. late Paymaster of the 23d or Royal Welsh Fusilier Regiment, who, under the Patronage of His Royal Highnels the Duke of Kent; introduced this new System into this Province, and who has generously, and without any Salary or reward, afforded his unremitting, attention and exertions in its establishment, and progress. That the petitioners, in the perfuafion that this Honorable Houfe will be fenfible of the benefits of the Inflitution to which they thus folicit their attention, beg leave to entreat, fuch pecuniary aid towards its fupport, and continuance, as to them, in their wifdom shall think fit to bestow.

Ordered, That the petition do lie on the Table.

On motion the House resolved itself into a committee of the whole House, on the confideration of the several Bills which stood committed.

Mr. Speaker left the Chair,

Mr. Wells took the Chair,

Mr. Speaker refumed the Chair.

The Chairman reported from the committee that they had gone through the Bill to encourage the raifing of Bread Corn, and the clearing of new Lands; and alfo the Bill to revive and continue an ACt, paffed in the 50th year of his Majeity's Reign, to encourage the Fifheries of the Province : and that the committee had directed him to report the faid Bills, feverally, without any amendment, and he afterwards delivered the Bills in at the Clerk's Table.

The Chairman also acquainted the House that he was directed by the committee to move for leave to fit again on the confideration of the Bills to them referred, which report the House agreed to.

Ordered, That the Bills be engroffed.

A Meffage from the Council by Mr. Cogswell:

Mr.
