Journal of each day, after the adjournment.

Ordered, that Mr. Hyndman, Mr. Brenan and Mr. Pope do compose the said Committee.

On motion of Mr. Brenan—Resolved, that a Committee be appointed to examine Bills to be engrossed, or that have been engrossed.

Ordered, that Mr. Brenan, Mr. J. S. Macdonald and Mr. Binns do compose the said Committee.

Ordered, that the Chaplain have notice to attend the House each morning during the Session, to read Prayers before the House proceeds to business.

Ordered, that a copy of the Journal be sent to His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, each day, as soon as possible after the adjournment.

On motion of Mr. Brenan-

Resolved, that a day be fixed to take in Tenders for the Printing of the Journals of this House, in order that it may be given to the person who will give security to perform the same the best, and on the lowest terms.

Whereupon it was ordered, that Tenders be received at Twelve o'clock, noon, on Friday next, and that the Clerk do notify the different Printers, residing in Charlotte-Town that Tenders will then be received accordingly, accompanied with Specimens of the paper and style of Printing—the size of the work to correspond with the Journals of last Session.

The Clerk laid before the House Copies of the Correspondence which had taken place between the Colony Agent and the Committee of Correspondence, since the last sitting of the Legislature, which were read.

Then the House adjourned until to morrow

at Ten o'clock.

RESOLVED, that a Committee of Five Members be appointed, to examine and report on the Public Accounts; with power to send for Persons, Papers and Records.

Ordered, that Mr. Owen, Mr. Hyndman, Mr. Dalrymple, Mr. A. Macdonald and Mr. Binns do compose the said Committee.

Mr. Pope, in his place, laid before the House his Accounts as Collector of Impost and Excise for the District of Bedeque, for the Quarters ending 31st March, 30th June, 30th September, and 31st December, 1833:

Also, the Light Duty Accounts for the same District, for the Quarters ending 30th June, 30th September, and 31st December, 1833.

Ordered, that the said Accounts be referred to the Committee appointed to examine and report on the Public Accounts.

Mr. Pope, from the Special Committee appointed to prepare and report the draught of an Address in answer to the Speech of His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor to both Houses at the opening of the present Session, reported the draught of an Address, as prepared by the Committee—and he read the same in his place, and afterwards delivered it in at the Clerk's Table, where it was again read, and is as follows:—

To His Excellency Lieutenant Colonel ARETAS WIL-LIAM YOUNG, Lieutenant Governor and Commander in Chief in and over His Majesty's Island Prince Edward, and the Territories thereunto adjacent, Chancellor and Vice Admircs of the same, &c. &c. &c.

May it please your Excellency,

We the Representatives of His Majesty's loyal subjects of Prince Edward Island, in Colonial Parliament assembled, respectfully thank your Excellency for your Speech, delivered at the opening of the present Session, and for again calling us together at a period best suited to our personal convenience—We trust your Excellency will not be disappointed in your just expectation that, in the execution of the important duties which devolve upon us, the furtherance of the public good will receive our most particular attention.

We shall be happy to receive copies of the Despatches and Census alluded to by your Excellency, at as early a period as may meet your Excellency's convenience.

It is with much satisfaction we learn from your Excellency that the Population of the Island has so rapidly increased as to be nearly one third more than in the year 1827, a circumstance which must necessarily tend to the progressive improvement of the Colony: and we confidently hope, that the fertility and hitherto undeveloped resources of this Country will yet be the means of augmenting its population in a much greater ratio.

We duly appreciate the motives which induced your Excellency, during the last summer, to visit different parts of the Island; and sincerely hope that your Excel-
