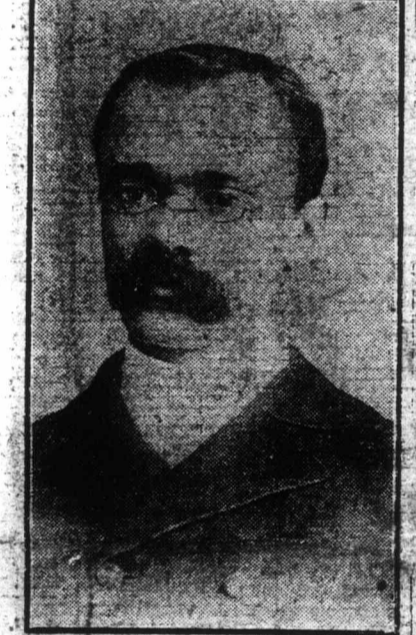
IMPORTANCE OF SUNDAY SCHOOLS

STUART CASE BEFORE COURT

Defendant Was a Road Commissioner

EXPENDED MONEY So Unlawfully Hence the Trial

HOPEWELL, N. B., June 16.—The Stuart case, which opened yesterday afternoon, resumed business at 10 o'clock this morning when the civil suit of Murray v. Barber was concluded, a verdict being rendered for the defendant.

The greater part of today's session was occupied with the case of the King v. Daniel W. Stuart, in which the defendant is charged with the wrongful use of public moneys when road supervisor in Hopewell parish. The case, which has attracted much interest, came over from the October term, when a true bill was found. Mr. Stuart when road superintendent, assigned to the extent of some \$12 of public money in building an abutment on the S. & H. Railway at Riverside, where the railroad runs parallel to the highway, the idea being, it is claimed, that the railway would protect the highway.

The defense also claims that the outlay was fully authorized by the public works department and the then members for the county. The prosecution contend the outlay unlawful and that the railway was a right to do the work without help.

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DISCUSS "WHITE SLAVE TRAFFIC"

Opening of International Congress of Women at Toronto

European Workers Tell of Advances Made in Suppression of Traffic

Women's Suffrage Also Discussed -- Welcome by Lady Aberdeen

TORONTO, Ont., June 16.—Delegates to the International Congress of Women arrived in large numbers today.

Several meetings of international standing committees were held. Committees on "peace and arbitration," "laws concerning the legal position of women," and "white slave traffic," met in the university classrooms, about fifty ladies being present at each. The chairman at the last named was Frouke Schenker, of Copenhagen, who after thirty-five years of school work, gave up her position as head mistress of a higher girls' school to devote her time mainly to philanthropy. She is honorarily treasurer of the Danish national committee for the suppression of the white slave traffic.

Frouke Schenker showed herself a mistress of the situation as chairman of the day, and her address, giving addresses of houses of ill-repute, but that a woman's suffrage was the use of several different languages.

Mrs. Hattie Stevens of Toronto, representing the white slave traffic, said that 30,000 girls were lured to this city by means of advertisements in the papers, and that she represented to meet young girls at Union station and warn them against certain addresses.

"The white slave traffic," said Frouke Schenker, "is a very real and terrible evil, and it is our duty to do all in our power to suppress it."

The meeting of standing committees on "women's suffrage and rights of citizenship" this afternoon was enthusiastic.

Rev. Dr. Anna Howard Shaw, ordained clergy woman of the Methodist Church in the United States, took the chair. She called on representatives of different countries for reports and advice as to methods.

Mrs. Rachel Foster Avery spoke for the United States.

Dr. Stowe Gullen for Canada, and Frau Stitt, president of the German national, for Germany.

Frouke Schenker said in Sweden a bill for women's suffrage had been passed in the second chamber, but was thrown out in that corresponding to the House of Lords.

Frouke Schenker of Denmark stated in her country women had this year in March voted for the first time in municipal affairs.

Dr. Stowe Gullen of England read a report of Mrs. Forster on suffragette campaigns in England in the course of which it was said suffragettes believed that even opposition of influential people was beneficial, as it provoked discussion.

Lady Aberdeen welcomed the delegates to the official opening of congress tonight.

GERMANY WOODING CANADIAN TRADE

Association is Booming Products to Effect a Treaty

LONDON, June 15.—Writing in the Journal des Debats, Robert Duceable, a government counselor of foreign commerce, says the results of the tariff war between Canada and Germany have given rise to much uneasiness in Germany, which will likely be aggravated by the recent Franco-Canadian conventions. A German-Canadian association has accordingly been formed in Berlin with the object of securing the abolition of the Canadian surtax in return for an extension of the continental tariff to Canadian products, thus counteracting the disastrous effects on the preferential treatment accorded to British goods.

The German government is also considering the best means of rendering the Canadian and German markets more accessible to each other. To this the Canadian government is apparently favorably disposed.

The Berlin association has decided to send a Canadian deputation of representative business men. Meanwhile the association is organizing public lectures, publishing pamphlets and extending the sale of Canadian products and the immense resources of Canada, pointing out the advantages of the country as a field for German emigration. The propaganda is being carried on in the hope that Canada will display gratitude towards the nation which shows a preference for the produce of the Dominion above that of all other countries.

WOMAN CRIES 'FRAUD' IN DIVORCE ACTION

Justice Moved to Tears by Story of Discarded Wife

NEW YORK, June 15.—Justice Dietrich in the supreme court was moved to tears today after he had heard the story of Mrs. Bertha Rose, who declared her husband had obtained a divorce from her by fraud and was now trying to malign the name of their two little girls.

The case came up on a motion filed by Attorney Robert Scherer to set aside a decree of divorce granted to Rose, under the name of Rosenburg, some time ago, while the woman, who is now living in this city, was in Russia.

Rose filed affidavits denying the woman's statements and Justice Dietrich ordered that briefs be filed. It was Justice Dietrich who granted the divorce decree.

Mrs. Rose says she is penniless and has no means of supporting the two children, Florence, 7 years old, and Grace, 6. She declares her husband was married last October to Anna Ida Sigel, an actress, and that they are now living in this city.

Wealthy Jewish women of New York are aiding Mrs. Rose in her fight. Attorney Scherer says the district attorney is investigating charges against Rose.

SWINDLER IS CAUGHT THROUGH CARICATURE

Sketches by Idiot Clerk While She Ordered Valuable Goods

NEW YORK, June 15.—John H. Taylor, a clerk employed by the Gorham Company, silversmiths, at Fifth Avenue and Thirty-fifth street, had not been a clever sketch artist, Eleanor Lorraine Beattie, formerly of New York, who was arrested today in London under the name of Miss Bona Blake, on a charge of grand larceny, might still be at liberty, although it is likely that her six feet of stature would have betrayed her.
