Wilson Appeals to U. S. For Co-operation in War

Navy is on War Footing, Army About to be Equipped; Food Production Required Nto for U. S. Alone, But For Allies Also

By Courier Leased Wire. Washington, April 16.—President Wilson in a proclamation addressed to his fellow countrymen last night, said:

"We are rapidly putting our navy on an effective war footing, and are about to create and equip a great army, but these are the simplest parts of the great task, to which we have addressed ourselves. There is not a single selfish element so far as I can see, in the cause we are fighting for. We are fighting for what we believe and wish to be the rights of man and for the future peace and security of the world. To do this great thing worthily and successfully, we must devote ourselves to the service without regard to profit or material advantage, and with an energy and intelligence that will rise to the level of the enterprise itself."

"These then are the things we must do and do well, besides fighting—the things without which mere fighting would be fruitless: "We must supply abundant food for ourselves and for our armies and abundant material for our ships and our planes, not only, but also for a large part of the nations with whom we have now made common cause, in whose support and by whose sides we shall be fighting."

CAVALRY IS USED

Continued from page one. held a clump of woods. The horsemen attacked it in open order at a gallop. Canadian Headquarters in France, April 16.—The enemy fled in haste taking machine guns with them, but suffered many casualties before they found safety in a trench on the far side of the wood. The element of surprise caused the enemy to shoot wild. There were few Canadian casualties, though some horses were hit. In this action, a lieutenant of a western regiment had a horse shot under him, and jumped on a troop horse. This also was shot under him and he finished the charge upon the wood on foot. The capture of the village on which the cavalry were congratulated by the commander of the army to which they were attached, followed. Before the German retreat, saying that those employed in the village their wire defenses had been turned from the rear. The long cavalry sword is still a formidable weapon in a charge. In the capture of a certain hill from a wood, the enemy infantry, a squadron of dragoons charged with drawn swords capturing nine and killing and mortally wounded six of the enemy. Machine guns and aid in the effectiveness of the work of our cavalry as open warfare develops.

Peace Conference

The Hague, via London, April 17.—International Socialist circles are gratified at the latest news from Russia, according to which the new regime is becoming finally established with the power of the Socialist extremists very small, compared to that of those who favor a lasting rather than a patched up peace. A reserved attitude is adopted in regard to the expected fruits of the conference, which it is decided to call at Stockholm, but the International Socialists are keenly anxious to miss no chance of making their influence felt in the eventual reorganization of Europe.
