Fatal Accident on D. A. R. Track

A very sad accident occurred Wednesday morning resulting in the death of Mrs. McCall, wife of Private Frank McCall, now on active service in France. The deceased lived in the old Master's House, Main St., and it is believed she was crossing the D. A. R. tracks when she was struck by a shunting train. The details of the fatality are not known as the incident was not witnessed.

About twelve o'clock the body of the victim was found near the track by Mr. Arthur Ellis, an employee of the railway. The remains were removed to one of the car sheds and an inquest held in the afternoon at two o'clock by Coroner Dr. Webster. The jury consisted of Messrs Emmerson Graves, foreman; G. H. Oakes, A. A. DeWolfe, A. C. Sheridan, Pitt Martin, L. Charlton, Amos Fisher, A. C. Hawkins, W. E. Webster, W. F. Hiltz, W. E. Porter.

The verdict was—"In stantaneous Death."

The deceased was formerly Miss May Stillman. She is survived by her father, her husband and 3 small children.

The funeral service was held yesterday afternoon & was conducted by Rev. T. C. Mellor. Deceased was 23 years of age.

Dr. Wilfrid E. Harris Died on Tuesday

Dr. Wilfrid E. Harris died at Boston on Tuesday afternoon as the result of being shot by Dr. Atwood, a few days previous at his office. Dr. Harris began to sink rapidly on Monday afternoon, and all through the night the end was momentarily expected. For the few days the injured doctor's wife and niece have been almost constantly at his bedside. Dr. Atwood has shown no emotion whatever since the evening of the day the crime was committed. No arrangements have been announced for the funeral.

Dr. Harris was a native of Kings County and President of the Massachusetts college of Osteopathy. He was son of the late T. R. Harris, M.P.P. and brother of Mr. Fred E. Harris of Aylesford. He was 45 years of age and had made a great success of his profession, ranking as one of the pioneer osteopaths in the United States. He was at one time President of the Canadian Club in Boston and was highly esteemed in that city as well as in his native province.

Parson Shingled Church

Rev. W. N. States who spent a month at Greenville, Yarmouth Co., working in the interests of the colored people there for the Home Mission board, arrived home a few days ago, having done good work there. He, besides preaching and holding services, acted as did Paul, that is working with his own hands, and shingling half the church while he was there.
