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THE 12th IN ATHENS

A Large Gathering of Orangemen, Friends of the Cause, &c., &c., &c.

On Monday the Orangemen and kindred societies of this district assembled in Athens to commemorate the glorious triumph of William Prince of Orange.

The day was all that could be desired. From noon till night the sun beamed brightly, while a brisk breeze tempered the atmosphere and made either walking or driving a pleasure.

The local Orangemen had made every arrangement for the reception and entertainment of the visiting brethren, and the whole program of the day was carried out with highly commendable order and dispatch.

The Toledo Brass Band had been engaged by the local lodge, and its inspiring music welcomed the different lodges as they, with wife and drum and streaming banners, entered the village.

First to arrive was the contingent from the west who came by train to the number of nearly four hundred.

To give an idea of the enthusiastic loyalty which prevails these societies, we mention the fact of Bedford Mills Lodge of Fraternal Boys No. 46 being present, under the leadership of Master Wm. Crookery.

Bedford Mills is 35 miles distant and to reach here the young men had to arise at 3 a.m. and walk eight miles to catch the train.

But as they flung their banners to the breeze and marched from the Athens station they presented a fine appearance—a credit to the place from whence they came.

The other lodges of thirteen, arrived shortly after, and during the forenoon Main street was a blaze of color, glittering regalia, and flaunting banners.

Crowds lined the streets listening to the various bands, and taken altogether it was a most imposing scene.

Our two excellent hotels had made great preparations for catering to the wants of the visitors and their capabilities were taxed to the utmost.

How well they succeeded is borne witness to by the hundreds who were served with dinner decently and in order.

About 2 p.m. the lodges were marshalled in procession on Main street, from which they marched, headed by their respective bands, along Elgin to Church, along Church to Reid, and thence along Main to Tappin's grove, where a stand had been erected for the speakers and band, and seats provided for the audience.

Unfortunately the wind was against the speakers and they had great difficulty in making themselves heard beyond a narrow circle.

Mr. Thos. Bernery, County Master, presided, and introduced the different speakers. Mr. Woods, M.P., was the first to address the meeting, and his discourse on the duties of Orangemen and citizens generally in relation to the present and future political-religious questions, was clearly outlined.

The Revue of Athens, Mr. W. G. Parish, being called upon, welcomed, in a few well chosen words, the different societies present.

Rev. Wm. Wright, rector of Christ Church, Athens, gave an eloquent address, in which he warmly commended the celebrating of such anniversaries as the 12th, holding it to be well to bear in remembrance the deeds that have given us the full measure of civil and religious liberty which we now enjoy.

Mr. James Bernery, the well-known Equal Righter, was the next speaker, and the fervid eloquence with which he recited the acts and described the conditions that led up to the climax, the anniversary of which they were celebrating, roused to enthusiasm the younger men, and fanned to a blaze the loyal fire that glowed in the breasts of the many veteran Orangemen within the sound of his voice.

He was frequently interrupted by the applause of his auditors, and brought forth their own eloquent words, reciting "the Reformer and Orangemen."

It was regretted that Rev. Mr. Moore of Lyndhurst, could not be present, but his place was ably filled by Rev. Mr. French, who in the capacity of Superintendent of Anglican Missions, had acquired an extensive knowledge of the people of British America and Canada.

His discourse was scholarly and entertaining and was listened to with attention. At its conclusion he was warmly applauded.

The lodges then re-formed and returned to Main street, where cheers were given for the County Master and the Queen, after which they adjourned for supper.

Throughout the day the best of good feeling prevailed in all quarters, and the absence of any disorderly conduct was a marked feature of the celebration.
