Toronto, June 17.—Butter—Offerings continue large of both creamery and dairy, but the quality is still capable of much improvement. Prices are unchanged.

Eggs—The price continues steady at 14c, being assisted by an unsettled weather.

Potatoes—There is a fair demand and prices are steady. Cars on the track here are quoted at 75c. Potatoes out of store sell at 85c.

Hope—Trade quiet, with prices steady at 13c; yearlings 7c.
Dried apples—Trade is quiet, and the price is unchanged at 5 to 5 1/2-2c per lb. Evaporated, 10 1/2-2c to 11c.

Poultry—There is little demand and offerings are very light. Prices are nominal. Turkeys are quoted at 10c to 12c, and chickens at 90c to 95c.

EUROPEAN GRAIN MARKETS.

London, June 17.—Close—Wheat, on passage quiet, but steady; maize, on passage, quiet and steady. Wheat, English country markets of yesterday quiet, but steady; French country markets weak.

Paris, June 17.—Open—Wheat, tone firm; June, 22f 90c; September and December, 21f 15c.

Antwerp, June 17.—No. 2 red winter, 17 1/2-2f.

London, June 17.—Close—Mark Lane Miller market—Wheat, foreign, quiet and steady; English steady; Maize, American, nothing doing; Danubian steady. Flour, American, better demand at full rates; English steady.

TORONTO HAY AND STRAW.

Toronto, June 17.—Baled Hay—Offerings are liberal and demand is light. Prices are easier around \$10 per ton for No. 1 timothy on track here.

Baled Straw—There is a fair demand and offerings are medium at \$5 on track here.

TORONTO PROVISIONS.

Toronto, June 17.—The demand for all hog products is very strong and the prices firm. Long clear bacon has advanced 1-2c per lb., as stocks are running light.

Pork—Canada, short cut, \$23.50; heavy mess, \$21.50 to \$22; clear shoulder mess, \$19.

Smoked and Dry Salted Meats—Long clear bacon 11 1/2-2c; hams 13 1/2-2c to 14c; rolls, 11 1/2-2c to 12c; shoulders 11 1/2-2c; backs, 14 1/2-2c; to 15c; breakfast bacon 14 1/2-2c to 15c; green meats out of pickle, are quoted at 1c less than smoked.

Lard—Tierces 11 1/2-2c, tubs 11 1/2-2c, and pails 11 3/4-2c.

TORONTO FRUITS.

Toronto, June 17.—The wholesale fruit market will open to-morrow. The trade this week has been good. Apples have ceased offering in barrels. Valencia oranges are no longer offering. Florida pine apples are 25c per crate higher. Tomatoes are 50c to \$1 per 4-bushel carrier cheaper and straw berries are from 3c to 5c per qt cheaper.

A further drop in the price of strawberries is expected almost any day, as the Ontario fruit is beginning to offer freely. Cherries from the Niagara district are selling now at \$1.25 to \$1.50 per basket. Other fruits are steady and there is a good demand for all classes. We quote:

Bananas, per bunch, \$2.00 to \$3.00.
Florida pineapples, 30's and 40's \$3.00 to \$3.50 per case.
Oranges, \$7.
Tomatoes, 4-bushel carrier, \$1.50.
Strawberries, per quart, 10c to 14c.
Cherries, per basket, \$1.25 to \$1.50.

TORONTO GRAIN MARKET.

Toronto, June 17.—Wheat—The market is quiet with local dealers quoting 76c middle freights for red and white and holders asking 77c to 78c. Goose is steady at 75c for No. 2 east, Manitoba is steady at 85c, for No. 1 hard 83c for No. 1 northern and 81 1/2-2c for No. 2 northern, g. i. t.

Flour—Is steady. Three cars of 90 per cent sold at \$2.92 1/2-2c in buyers' bags, at middle freights, and some more was offered at \$2.90.

Choice brands are held at 15c to 20c higher. Manitoba flour is steady at \$3.90 to \$4.25 for Hungarian patents; \$3.90 to \$3.90 for strong bakers' bags included, on the track, Toronto.

Milled—Is firm for shorts at \$20 bid for scara and easy at \$17 for bran in bulk, medium freights. Manitoba milled—Is firm at \$23 for cars of shorts and \$20 for bran, sacks, included, Toronto freights.

Barley—Is nominal at 52c for cars of No. 2, 2 mixed and 62c for No. 2 yellow west.

Corn—Is easier at 61c for Canada No. 2 mixed and 62c for No. 2 yellow west.

Oats—Are steady. No. 2 white are quoted 46c east and 45c west.

Oatmeal—Is steady at \$4.70 for cars of bags and \$4.85 for barrels on the track, Toronto, and 25c more for broken lots.

Peas—Are nominal at 76c middle freights.

MONTREAL LIVE STOCK.

Montreal, June 17.—There were some 400 head of butchers' cattle, 200 calves and 700 sheep and lambs offered for sale at the east end abattoir yesterday. The larger portion of the cattle were good, and would not bring over \$1 1/2-2c per lb. while the leaner ones would not bring 3c per lb. All stall-fed cattle were in active demand at higher prices, qualities considered. Shippers were buying anything at all suitable to fill up space on outgoing steamer, and they paid from 3 3/4-2c to 4 1/2-2c for bulls, from 5c to 5 1/2-2c for large cows and for a lot of rather uneven distillery fed cattle from Berthier they paid 6c per lb. Mr. G. Martell bought 11 good cattle at from 5 3/4-2c to near 6 1/2-2c per lb. Putty good cattle sold at from 4c to 5 1/2-2c and the common stock from 3c to 3 3/4-2c per lb.

Calves are sold at from \$2.50 to \$3 each. Shippers paid 3 3/4-2c per lb. for good large sheep, but they will pay only 3 1/2-2c after to-day.

Butchers paid from 3 1/2-2c to 3 3/4-2c per lb. for old sheep and from 3 3/4-2c to 4c per lb. for young. Lambs sold at from \$2.25 to \$4 each. Fat hogs sold in lots at about 6 3/4-2c per lb. weighed off the cars.
