PAPER DISPENSED WITH A Substitute For the News Sheet With

An engineer of Agram, Hungary, has invented a new material which, he claims, will absolutely dispense with the paper for newspaper pur-poses. He intends to print them on his new material, which is said to have the great advantages of being much thinner, almost untearable, plainer, and much better adapted for pression. The inventor also states that by means of a special chemica preparation the print can be washed off and the sheetr may be reprinted. The new material is not made from fibers, but is a chemical production, "the composition of which I cannot," said the inventor, "give away as yet. As soon as I shall have secured patents in Austria-Hungary and in all other industrial countries, I shall make my process public. can produce this material in any de sired shape and size, and this at a supprisingly low cost. It will bring about a revolution throughout the civilized world."

The newspaper readers, instead of throwing the papers away after they are through with them, may return them, weekly or monthly, to the printing house, where they will be chemically washed off and printed over again. Rotation print will, of course, have to be dispensed with but I am absolutely convinced that most of the dailies of the world will take to my material." A most reliable Hamburg paper, from which these notes are taken (the Hamburger Nachrichten) adds that the inven tor went with samples of his new material to London, and that he succeeded in interesting a powerful financial syndicate in the matter. As soon as the patents have been taken out a large factory for manufacture of the new material will be erected in the neighborhood of Agram.

Forest and Stream: In picking up your gun from lying flat, standing against anything, from a companion or a boat, do not take hold of the muzzle and drag it towards you; take hold of it by the forestock and barrel if you are only using one hand; it two, in the regular way you grasp it when you go to shoot. Little Venders of Liverpool. Nearly twelve hundred boys and girls are licensed by the City Council of Liverpool to sell newspapers, matches, bootlaces, etc., upon Before the licenses are streets. granted consent must be obtained of parents and guardians, as well as of the local school officials. The age limit for girls is from eleven to sixteen years, and for boys from eleven to fourteen years. No child is allowed to peddle in the streets after 9 o'clock in the evening. All must be decently clad and free from physical defects. No business must be done during school hours, and on no account must one of the children enter a public house or place of amuse-ment for trading purposes.
