## MR. EMMERSON DENIES CHARGE

Declares He Was Never  
Ejected From Montreal  
Hotel

Explains the Incidents that  
Gave Rise To The Libel  
Suit

Fredericton, N. B., May 31.—Yesterday was redolent with surprises and rich in dramatic incidents in the Emerson charges of criminal libel against the editor of The Gleaner.

Just now the issue narrows to a point of veracity between Mr. Emerson and Harry Deane, once night watchman at the St. Lawrence Hall. The facts are so nearly agreed upon that judgment in the end must depend only upon the inference to be drawn.

Indeed, the case, if submitted to a jury, will be largely decided upon Mr. Emerson's testimony.

**Mr. Emerson's Story.**  
Mr. Emerson, examined by Mr. White, stated: On Sunday, June 10, 1906, he left Ottawa for Montreal, arriving about 7.30 p.m. He was assigned a room at the St. Lawrence Hall. He glanced over the hotel register and found the names of Mrs. Allen and Mrs. Beauthner. He went to their room and, at his suggestion, the party went for refreshments to the Oxford Cafe. They returned to the hotel about 10.30 and, after a brief conversation at the door of the ladies' room, he went to his own apartment. He was awakened by a knock on the door and found the two ladies, Mrs. Beauthner somewhat hysterical. They complained that a porter had come to their room and insulted them, and Mrs. Beauthner insisted upon leaving the hotel. Mr. Emerson asked them to wait, and stepped into the bathroom. Meanwhile another porter appeared and made some apology, and both Mr. Emerson and Mrs. Allen urged Mrs. Beauthner to quiet down.

He afterwards escorted them to another hotel.

Mr. Emerson declared that both of the ladies were of irreproachable character, and Mrs. Allen moved in the best society of Montreal, and had been known by him since his childhood. The other he knew slightly, but esteemed her of blameless life.

Cross-examined by Mr. Hazen, Mr. Emerson denied that he came to Montreal by appointment with them on the following Sunday, and also that the women were with him in his room, and that the lights were turned off. Possibly they were in his room while he was in the bathroom.

He denied that the porter came to the room and ordered the three of them to make less noise.

He did not ask what the porter had said to the ladies, or in what way they were insulted.

He had given the money to Mrs. Beauthner to pay his bill and to hire a carriage, because she was fully dressed for the street and he was not.

He denied that either lady was in his room after midnight, clad in a kimono.

He denied all improper conduct.

The next morning he had returned to Ottawa.

Upon re-examination, Mr. Emerson recalled that Mrs. Allen's father had been his father-in-law's private secretary. He declared that Mrs. Allen was of untainted character.

**Plea of Defence.**

With the conclusion of Mr. Emerson's testimony, the crown rested. Mr. Crockett was then formally arraigned, and his counsel stated that he had admitted writing the article, that he claimed that it was true, and that the matter contained therein was true, and that long before the publication by The Gleaner, it had become a matter of public discussion among the people, by the public press and in Parliament.

**Porter's Testimony.**

Harry Deane, night porter, testified that about 12 o'clock he saw two ladies going towards Emerson's room. They were in dressing gowns. They had left the door of room 9 open, and he closed it. At 1.30 he heard loud talk and loud laughter in Emerson's room. The voices indicated that two ladies and a gentleman were in the party. Witnesses tapped on the door. After two or three minutes the door was opened. A tall woman came to the door. The room was dark, although there may have been a light in the bath. He told her and the party generally that they must keep quiet. She said, "All right," and shut the door.

He then reported the occurrence to Lloyd, the night clerk, and, acting under Lloyd's direction, returned to room 137. Mrs. Beauthner opened the door. He said to the party inside, "You will have to make less noise or get out of the hotel." Mr. Emerson and the two ladies were then in room 137. The room was now lighted up.

Question: Did you see the bed? Answer: Yes.

Question: Had it been occupied? Answer: Yes.

A few moments later he saw the three leaving.

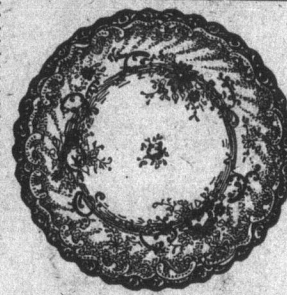
