In Perpetual Fear of Death.

Gen. Trepoff's death was due to natural causes; but the revolutionists can at least claim partial responsibility for his end, as his illness was superinduced by the contant strain due to perpetual fear of death, which, with lack of exercise and recreation during the last two years, wore down his originally superb constitution. He had become so nervous of late that recently, when a military attache of a continental power was unexpectedly ushered into his room, Gen. Trepoff sprang to his feet and stood in an attitude of defence, but when he recognized the visitor he

A Despot by Inclination.

Gen, Trepoff was in many respects a remarkable man. He was a natural despot, a tyrant by inclination, education and conviction. He was one of those men who have constantly appeared, like evil geniuses, in Russian history just at the time when conditions were most promising for putting an end to despotism, turning the Russian rules from Liberalism back into paths of reaction. Trepoff was a police master.
