A circular has been issued by the Canadian Patriotic Fund headquarters which states that in view of the heavy calls and the likelihood of the war lasting for some considerable time yet, it has been decided to discontinue allowances, for the present, to dependents of men on active home service. Certain individual cases may receive compassionate allowances at the discretion of the local committee. The new rule went into force on 1st September. It is the generally expressed opinion throughout the Dominion that the dependents of those who are on active service at the front should be looked after first of all.

Four men were each fined \$50 and costs, or six months imprisonment, recently, for neglecting to control the spreading of fire while land-clearing at North Burnaby. The magistrate pointed out their liability to prosecution for permitting the fire to go beyond certain boundaries. Owing to the great amount of damage caused this season by fire it is possible that further prosecutions may be entered other parties in the same district and elsewhere.

WAS ON ARABIC.

New York, Sept. 2.—Mrs. Zella Covington, a Los Angeles actress, arrived here today from Liverpool on the liner St. Paul. She was a passenger on the Arabic when the liner was sent to the bottom by a German submarine.

"The Arabic," said Mrs. Covington "was sunk without warning. Second Officer Steel was on the bridge and the first to see the torpedo. He called our attention to it. The Arabic sank six minutes later.

"My husband and myself were in the lifeboat for five hours."

WENT FROM VANCOUVER.

London, Sept. 2.—Capt. Isaac, D.S.O., of the Rifle Brigade, unofficially reported killed, was a member of the Vancouver Trust Corporation. He received the Distinguished Service medal in November.

STRIKE AT HALIFAX.

Halifax, Sept. 2.—Over 100 coal handlers struck here yesterday, demanding increased pay. They had been getting 30 cents an hour for day and 35 cents for night work, and ask for 35 and 40 cents respectively. They also demand some changes in working conditions.

BADLY MANGLED BY A GRIZZLY

Skagway, Alaska, Sept. 2.—A story of the frantic fight of Bert Bruner and Tom Webb, prospectors, near Atlin, with a grizzly, was told the other day, when John Bowden rushed into Atlin, after sixteen hours on the trail. Bruner and Webb were returning to their cabin, after a day's work on their claim, when they met a grizzly and her two cubs in the narrow trail.

The bear attacked the men, and despite their efforts to escape, they were severely injured. Bowden came along after the bear had been chased into the brush. He undertook to make the trip to Atlin for medical assistance. He made the forty-five miles over a poor trail, after sixteen hours of continuous travelling.

The Canadian government launch at Atlin was sent after the men, who are now in the hospital at Atlin. Webb is able to walk, but he is badly bitten about the chest and body. Bruner is severely injured. He has deep cuts on the head and arms, and both legs were badly lacerated.

Hartlepool, Sept. 2.—The British steamer Whitefield has been sunk. Her crew was saved. The Whitefield was a vessel of 2,422 tons. She was owned by W. MacLean Co. of West Hartlepool.
