REV. JOHN ALLISON DEAD.—Rev. John Allison died at St. Paul Minnesota, on Wednesday July 19th the result of a fall from a car. Mr. Allison was born in Cornwall, N. S., and belongs to a well known family. He is a half-brother of Mr. Joseph Allison, dyking merchant of St. John and head of the Mount Allison institution. For ten years, Mr. Allison was president of the Ladies' Association of Saville, and his wife, who was a sister of Mr. R. N. Knight, of Carleton, was chief preceptress. Her death was announced a few weeks ago. Mr. Allison when in New Brunswick was a very active member of the Methodist denomination, but he returned to the United States about 1865, and joined with the Presbyterians, becoming one of the most powerful preachers of that denomination in the west.
