

THE AFRIDIS WANT PEACE. Thirty-Three Alleged Murderers Arrested in Paris.

LATE DUCHESS OF TECK'S DEBTS There are seven vacancies in the Imperial House of Commons.

A convention of East Lambton Conservatives will be held at Watford on Jan. 19th.

The Empress of Germany, who has been suffering from influenza, has had a relapse.

The new Cuban Secretaries of the Provisional Government were sworn in at Havana.

Capt. Sylvester Neelon, a prominent contractor of St. Catharines, died suddenly in Toronto.

There is suspicion that Patrick Leahy and his five children were murdered at Ottawa.

The marriage of Lady Anne Coventry with Prince Duple Singh will take place to-morrow.

New South Wales will raise a loan of over £2,000,000 at 4 per cent. to defray the cost of public works.

There is a windfall in England for the heirs of John White, the first Attorney General of Upper Canada.

The third reading of the federation bill was carried in the New South Wales Legislature by a vote of 25 to 18.

As it will cost \$20,000 to repair the steamer Rosedale her owners have abandoned her to the underwriters.

Hon. Clifford Sifton has returned to Ottawa from Washington, and reports that his mission was entirely satisfactory.

The 60th anniversary of the Pope's celebration of mass was observed at the Vatican. His Holiness received many handsome presents.

Rain is still badly needed in Australia. A Sydney newspaper estimates that the loss of stock in the last three years amounted to \$10,000,000.

Canadian Pacific land sales for the past year show an enormous increase over the preceding year.

Another Tebbelone claimant has appeared. He is named Crosswell, and is an inmate of the Parramatta Lunatic Asylum, Australia. Experts have been engaged to examine him, but their report is not yet made.

Mr. J. P. Doran, of Ottawa, employed in W. C. Wells' lumbering establishment, was frozen to death on the trail between Palliser, B. C., and the camp. His faithful dog watched the body for two days and nights.

It is reported from Kuram that the Afridis are assembling in their usual cantonments, and are preparing to advance upon the enemy's camps near Lundi-Kotal, after the recent fighting, shots were fired at the Afridis, and they were standing with their rifles fixed to their belts, and their hands on their hips.

At London on Saturday the Amalgamated Society of Engineers paid out the sum of \$100,000 to 2,000 strikers who are on strike. The trades union conference has decided to levy a tax of three-pence weekly upon each of the members of trades unions throughout the country in aid of the strikers, who show no signs of yielding.

Inspector Rogers, of the Ontario Criminal Investigation Bureau, has spent the last two days at Toronto Junction investigating the mysterious death of Joseph Curly, the Weston farm laborer, whose lifeless body was found in the Keele street subway on Thursday morning.

Investigations have shown that Curly's death may have been the result of accident, and accident alone.

The London Daily Chronicle says the late Duchess of Teck left debts totaling the amount of £300,000, mostly household expenses. The expenditure at the White Lodge, which was the residence of the Duchess, exceeded, it appears, the £2,000 yearly. Whether the effects of the Duchess will be sold to meet the deficit depends upon whether the Government will apply to Parliament for funds to meet the emergency.

The Paris police, during the course of the past week, secured another of the organized gangs of murderers and robbers which have terrorized the suburbs of the French capital for months past. The new arrests number thirty-three, and the oldest prisoner is only twenty-one years of age. Within three months the bodies of fifty-three murdered persons have been found in a small section of the River Seine, and it is believed most of these murders are traceable to this gang.

MAGOWAN'S FINISH. The Former Mayor of Trenton Refused Lodgings at Most of the Hotels.

Trenton, N. J., Jan. 2.—While the wind was blowing a gale and the thermometer registered only a few degrees above zero New Year's morning, ex-Mayor Frank A. Magowan and Mrs. Barnes-Magowan were put out of the American House into the street.

Dressed in a light summer suit, Trenton's former mayor approached the line of cabmen standing before the hotel and asked to be driven to the different hotels that he might arrange for a place to stay, but he was obliged to walk. Each cabman who appealed to declined to move until the first received his pay, and Magowan soon learned that the men had formed a combination against him to obtain back fares. After appealing to all the hotels in the city to shelter him and his wife the management of the Barlow took the pair in, on condition that they pay two days' board in advance and leave the hotel at the end of forty-eight hours. This Magowan agreed to do. The former Mayor had difficulty in borrowing the money to pay the two days' board demanded.

ORDERED TO THE FRONT. Warwickshire and Lincolnshire Regiments to Move Forward.

THE DERIVISHES COMING NORTH. Cairo, Jan. 2.—The Warwickshire and Lincolnshire regiments of the British army have been ordered to start from Wady Halfa for the frontier.

Ordering of the troops to the front was occasioned by reliable news from Omdurman (the Khalfa's great camp near Khartoum) to the effect that the Derivishes are preparing a northward movement. Though the movement has not yet actually begun the greatest excitement prevails here.

A battalion of the Cameron Highlanders has been ordered to be in readiness to ascend the Nile a fortnight hence.

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CHINA MAY RESIST AGGRESSOR. Germany Served with a Demand to Evacuate.

ADMIRAL SEYMOUR AT HONG KONG. London, Jan. 2.—Vice-Admiral Seymour, R. N., who has been appointed British Consul-General in the China station, has just received a despatch from Hong Kong accompanied by his staff.

According to a special despatch from Shanghai, a sudden stiffening has taken place in the attitude of the Chinese Government toward the British. The Chinese Government has demanded that the British should evacuate the leased territories.

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WRECK OF THE GERONA. Struck a Rock on Seal Island and was Abandoned.

CREW ARRIVED SAFELY AT LAND. Halifax, Jan. 1.—A special despatch received here tonight from Barrington says the steamer Gerona, from Portland for London, with a general cargo, struck Seal Island at 4 o'clock this morning. She had four hundred crew on board, and twenty-four of the crew were killed. The captain and crew abandoned her and took to the boats. The second mate and twenty-four of the crew arrived at Forbes' Point, Woods Harbor, at noon to-day. The captain and thirty-six of the crew were lost. It is believed that the ship struck a rock, and the weather is too rough to-night to go to the scene of the wreck.

The Gerona was a fine steel steamer of 2,025 tons register, and was built at Dundee in 1888. Her managing owner was William Thompson, jun., of Dundee.

The Gerona's cargo is estimated to have been worth about \$210,000, including the live stock, and the steamer is valued at about \$150,000. The cargo was mostly insured through Montreal agencies. It consisted of 224 cattle, 60 horses, and great quantities of wool and pulp. A special retreived late tonight from Barrington reports the safe arrival of the two missing boats with their crews at Seal Island. They reached there some time yesterday or last night and have started for Yarmouth on a mail steamer. One sailor named Carl, who was supposed to leave the ship in the lifeboat which reached Woods Harbor, is missing, and is thought to have been drowned in attempting to get away from the steamer. Most of the men in this boat, which was in charge of Second Officer Watson, were killed. The others with Watson were: Steward McKenzie, First Carpenter McCathner, Second Carpenter Driscoll, Mess Room Steward Bell, Seaman Scott and White.
