Last night the committee of the Irish Protestant Benevolent Society met and made arrangements for the distribution of the annual Christmas cheer.

Mr. Thomas W. Watkins has very kindly offered the use of a store on King William street, just west of the Times office, and the distribution will take place there day before Christmas.

The necessity of a checking system to prevent over-issuing is again being felt.

There is no doubt, said a charity official to-day, that some people will get two and three baskets and that really deserving people will go without any.
