### India's Challenge To Canada

Graphic Description of Hindu Society, Religion and Morals by a Returned Missionary—Generous Response to His Appeal

A very interesting and most instructive lecture on India was given in the Newcastle Baptist church Thursday night by Rev Malcolm Orchard, a missionary home on furlough from Bobbili, in the Telugu country, eastern India, midway between Madras and Calcutta.

Rev Mr Orchard spoke of the Hindu faith in general, the status of its women, the progress of Christianity and India's challenge to Canada. The Hindu worship not only the G-ds but his own ancestors. The spirit of the dead can only rise to heaven when certain funeral rites are performed by his son, and can only be maintained there while such rites are performed once a year by his descendants. If any failure is made by one living man, all his dead ancestors fall from heaven and may become agents of evil to the living.

Women are accounted only the servants of men both in this life and in the next. As a son is needed to perform the funeral rites, the first care of a man is to have sons and grandsons. Hence early marriage, children of five are often betrothed. If a marriage produces no son in seven years the wife may be divorced, and the husband may remarry. But the wife may not remarry, and if her betrothed husband dies before she has lived with him she can never marry. A child widow is blamed for having caused her husband's or her betrothed's death by her sins in this or in some past life. She is degraded and must be a drudge. The wife is supposed to follow her husband whether he goes to Heaven or to Hell. Formally widows had to be burned on the funeral pyres of their husbands, but this is now forbidden by the British authorities. Voluntary suttee, however, occasionally occurs. He had known personally of one case.

There are now more than 7,000,000 Hindu widows under 12 years of age. If women are of so little importance, why educate them? says the Hindu. So they are not sent to school. Only lately have they been allowed to enter the temples. Hindus are not generally polygamous, but may be. Hindu social reformers are blocked by this ancestor worship. The women, who are the greatest sufferers are the most tenacious upholders of the system. It is hard to get girls into the government schools. Male missionaries cannot reach the women; only female workers can.

The people of India are Aryans, as we are, with our features and nearly white. They are intelligent, when given a chance, argumentative and philosophical. While the Methodists people have been assigned the spiritual oversight of some 10,000,000 Japanese, and a district in West China; the Presbyterians, Central India; and other churches, other districts, the Canadian Baptists have to evangelize the Telugu country, a strip of coast 380 miles long by 59 to 75 wide with 7500 villages and 4,500,000 people.

In this they have 24 districts, and have already established 14 girls' schools with 1000 pupils; 9 boarding schools for boys and girls, with 1000 pupils; an industrial school, where carpentry and blacksmithy are taught; 5 hospitals, that last year gave 80,000 treatments to 40,000 patients, including 1500 operations, 2 high schools, one of which has 600 boys and the other 1100; one seminary for training of religious workers and one Christian newspaper, which has a circulation of some 3000 copies in 1916 there were 597 bap

tlans, last year 800. In 10 years the number of converts had increased from 6000 to 10,000—48.23 per cent. In the same period the number of Mohammedans in all India had increased 5 per cent and of Hindus 6 per cent.

The Caste system is one of the chief curses of India. There are four main castes—Brahmins, or priests; warriors, merchants, farmers and artisans, and laborers. No man may change his caste, or marry outside of it or eat food prepared by one of another caste. These four castes have been subdivided into 100,000 sub-castes. Each trade and profession is now a separate caste, as the weavers, carpenters, etc.

In the Telugu country before the war workmen's wages were 6 cents a day for a man and 3 for a woman or boy. Now they are 8 cents and 4 or 5. Native workers are paid from \$2 to \$6 a month the married men getting the higher pay. There are now 16 missionaries and 750 native workers on the field. There are needed at once 10 more missionaries and nearly 5000 native workers.

If India is not soon converted she will drag us down to Heathenism or to scepticism. Hindus are knocking at our gates in Canada, and we can not long keep them out, for they have done nobly and loyally in the war, but their religion is so unspeakably immoral that we dare not admit them until they are Christianized. The Government schools are rapidly educating the Hindus, but without Christianity their scholars will, after throwing off heathenism, turn to scepticism and then there will be a bigger war than the present one. For India has 315,000,000 people and so with China, with her 400,000,000 we must Christianize them.

In his Sunday night's address, Rev Mr Orchard was glad to be able to announce that during the day one of the Newcastle congregation had undertaken to support a native worker himself at \$60 a year. Several in other congregations had done the same.
