CANADA'S LOSS

"Are honorable gentlemen quite satisfied with a condition of affairs where Canada, enjoying the possession of eighty to eighty five per cent of the asbestos resources of the world, sends those out almost wholly in the raw state, procurable for them only \$7,400,000, finds them manufactured in the United States and sold over there for \$75,000,000? Are we quite satisfied with a condition where we find Canadian raw material drifting there, employing but very few in Canada but providing the material for the employment of men in forty factories in the United States? If that is all right, if that is satisfactory to the Canadian people then nothing more can be said. If it is not satisfactory, the objective must be reached of bringing to this country the benefit of its own resources."—Mr. Meighen in enunciation of the Conservative Party's policy.

In the export of asbestos, according to Meighen's figures, \$70,000,000 is lost to Canada annually. To the same degree this country is losing in the export of raw material for the manufacture of paper. One-third of Canadian production going out in the raw returns nine or ten millions of dollars.

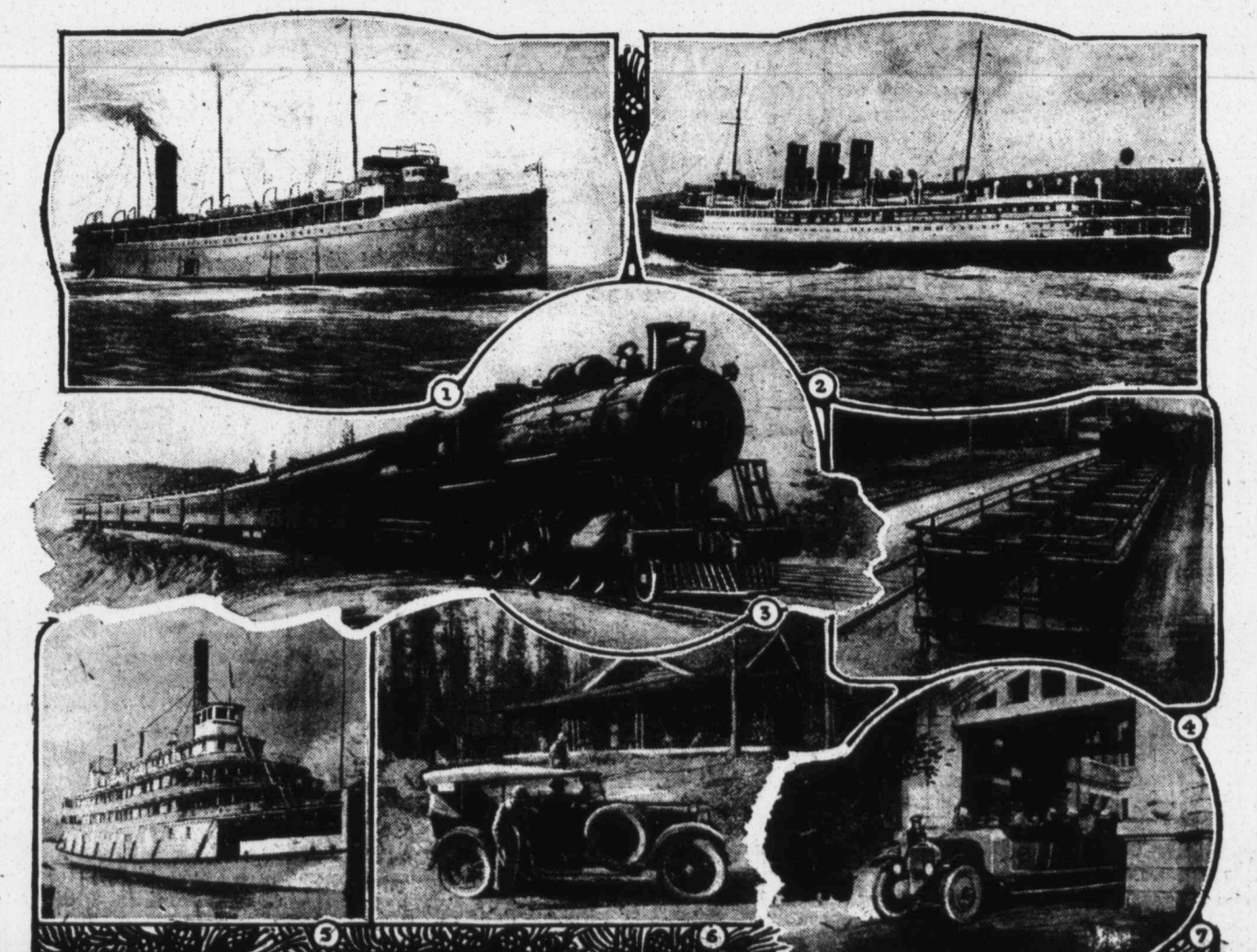
To Locate in Alberta

How Teachers Federation Will Tour Canada

Robert Louis Stevenson crossed the Pyrenees on a donkey. He even enjoyed the trip. Whatever physical discomforts he had to put up with were more than compensated for by the amount of knowledge he accumulated and by the deep pleasure he derived from coming into close contact with the beauties and wonders of nature. But the donkey, whatever his good points may be, is not now regarded as the most satisfactory means of transportation and we in Canada have a decided preference for the more comfortable and rapid conveyances depicted above. The picture illustrates the general system by which the various points of the Dominion have become linked up with one another by Canadian Pacific steamers, trains and automobiles. It also shows the means by which Dean Laird's special party of school-teachers will make their educational trip across Canada, from coast to coast, leaving Toronto on July 29th, arriving at Vancouver July 27th, and returning to Toronto early in August. A special train, (No. 3 in the illustration) will be utilized, and reduced rates are being offered to teachers who desire, as it were, to complete their own Stevenson tour by increasing their personal acquaintanceship with the country about which it is their duty to instruct the rising generation. Although the tour is arranged primarily for the benefit of school teachers, it is not restricted to them, and other professional and business people are taking advantage of the opportunity to make this combined pleasure and educational trip across the country. The party will travel by rail, with several stop-overs, to Vancouver, and from there will cross to Vancouver Island by a Canadian Pacific ferry boat (No. 2). From there by train they will proceed from Vancouver to Nelson, B.C., and thence via steamer (No. 5) over Lake Kootenay to Kootenay Landing. By rail again on to Windermere, from where the automobiles (No. 6) will convey them over the famous Banff-Windermere Highway to Banff. Entouraging once more, the party will go on to Edmonton, returning from there to Port Williams, from which point they travel by one of the Canadian Pacific Great Lakes Steamers to Port McNicholl (No. 1) and complete the tour from there to Toronto by rail.
