Separation. In his address to his constituents in

he Losberg district, General Botha emphatically denied the newspape statement that he recently expresse himself in favor of a moderate ex tension of the colored vote. He cer tainly would not allow the matter to e dealt with without a referendum. Referring to the question of the eutrality of South Africa in time f war, General Botha said he much egretted the publication in July last outh Africa's remaining neutral in the event of the United Kingdom being engaged in war, because it had created undeserved distrust and suspicion of the Dutch Afrikanders' loyalty. He insisted on the necessity to avoid injuring a better understanding between the two white races, and considered that the Volkstem doctrin was unjust.

There could not be the slightes doubt that only the government of a self-governed colony could decide whether its ships and troops should be sent out from their own territor to fight elsewhere in the event of Great Britain engaging in war, but the refusal to send ships and troops did not amount to a declaration of neutrality. Neutrality would mean the refusing of all facilities to British warships in the harbors of the Union, such as Simonstown, where the British Government had spent millions, o no more facilities than the South Af ricans dared give to the enemy's warships.
