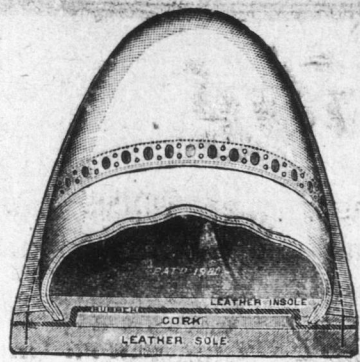

MARINE NOTES.

The S. S. Stephano did not leave New York until 7 a.m. yesterday and will be due here Thursday afternoon. The Bonavista leaves here tomorrow morning for Montreal.

The S. S. Mercator leaves here Thursday afternoon fish laden for Alicante and Naples.

The S. S. Bloodhound, Capt. Croucher, arrived at Carbonear this morning bringing Baine Johnston & Co's. crews from Battle Hr. and a small freight of oil, skins, etc.

The barqn. Lake Simcoe arrived at Penambuco yesterday after a run of 29 days from this port.

The schr. Mary Lloyd, Capt. Hughes arrived here this morning, coal laden, to Baine Johnstone & Co. after a run of 20 days from Glasgow. The weather was stormy the first part of the voyage, but very fine since the ship made this coast. For several days past she has had it calm but for which she would have been here Thursday last.

Fish Plentiful at Cape.

The little schr. Madonna, Capt. Jas. Wyse, arrived from Piacentia yesterday. She was becalmed off Cape St. Mary's Friday, and Capt. Wyse, says he never saw cod so plentiful there, though no boats are catching it now. His men threw hand-lines overboard and in a very short time jigged 60 large cod. If boats were at the Cape now they would make good catches and dispose of the cod green at the very best prices.

Plenty Squid.

Squid are very plentiful at Portugal Cove, but will not jig as dogfish are on the grounds frighten them. A lot was taken this morning and as cod is very abundant, boats Saturday and today took from 3 to 4 qtls. each.

Broke Down at Sea.

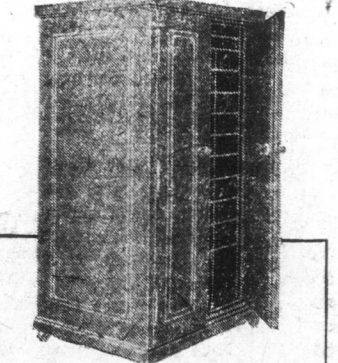

Sea Sleuth Honored.

DETECTIVE-SERGEANT BYRNE GETS ROYAL DECORATION.

The Irishman Who Keeps an Eye on the Big Liners is the First Detective of His Nationality to Receive Honors From the King—He is a Man of Exceptional Strength and Daring—Never Carries a Revolver.

Detective-Sergeant Byrne is the first man of the Irish police force to be singled out by King George for decoration. No Conan Doyle imaginary figure, but a most substantial, brawny, human reality, his record reads like a romance.

To trans-Atlantic travellers he is especially familiar, as he has run his eye over thousands of passenger lists in search of suspects. And every man or woman he has taken into custody has been found to be actually wanted by the headquarters police, though often he had to "chance his arm" and arrest purely on suspicion. A native of Roscommon, he joined the police about thirty years ago, and after a short country apprenticeship was drafted to Cork, where he served for thirteen years. Then, as a detective, he took Queenstown as his headquarters seventeen years ago, and during the last twelve of them, as chief officer of the port, he has captured over three hundred fugitives from justice.

One of his big arrests was a Frenchman charged with two murders and three cases of housebreaking in France. Arriving in Queenstown, he donned the disguise of a merchant sailor and was about to sign on as a hand on a sailing vessel just sailing for a long trip when he fell across Byrne, who saw through his disguise, and shipped him back to Havre, where he was convicted.

Fresh from Wall Street, on another occasion, on board a liner carrying twelve hundred passengers, came a confidential clerk named Andon who had made off with \$110,000. He met the eye of Byrne, who promptly invited him to a private conversation, resulting in his extradition by the next boat.

One day a young Englishman was walking down Queenstown while Byrne watched him for a few minutes, then crossed the road and arrested him on suspicion. He turned out to be a bank manager who had embezzled a large sum.

While walking along the saloon decks of liners, studying physiognomy, at various times he similarly detected the guilty secrets of a Berlin detective, a London stationmaster, a Glasgow insurance man, three Government officials and a host of smaller fry, who had to admit travelling under assumed names, and had no satisfactory explanation handy for it. After an unusually rapid series of arrests calling for his attendance at four different assize courts in as many days, Scotland Yard declared they must have this sleuth. But he prefers to remain as the guardian of Cork harbor. His chief boast is that not even the culprits he has brought to book have been able to complain of his methods. Many a time they have been armed, but Byrne never carries a revolver. He trusts entirely to his activity and the iron grip of his hands and arms.

General Botha on Dutch Loyalty.

Impossible for Colonies to Remain Neutral in Case of War Without Separation.

In his address to his constituents in the Losberg district, General Botha emphatically denied the newspaper statement that he recently expressed himself in favor of a moderate extension of the colored vote. He certainly would not allow the matter to be dealt with without a referendum.

Referring to the question of the neutrality of South Africa in time of war, General Botha said he much regretted the publication in July last of the Volkstem article advocating South Africa's remaining neutral in the event of the United Kingdom being engaged in war, because it had created undesired distrust and suspicion of the Dutch Afrikaners' loyalty. He insisted on the necessity to avoid injuring a better understanding between the two white races, and considered that the Volkstem doctrine was unjust.

There could not be the slightest doubt that only the government of a self-governed colony could decide whether its ships and troops should be sent out from their own territory to fight elsewhere in the event of Great Britain engaging in war, but the refusal to send ships and troops did not amount to a declaration of neutrality. Neutrality would mean the refusing of all facilities to British warships in the harbors of the Union, such as Simonstown, where the British Government had spent millions, or no more facilities than the South Africans dared give to the enemy's warships. It would also mean that every British soldier in South Africa would have to be disarmed, and that Great Britain would be treated on exactly the same footing as the enemy. The

Lloyd George May Be Leader.

Special Evening Telegram. LONDON, To-day.

Speaking at Glasgow, Mr. Balfour referred to Canada's decision of the question of Reciprocity, which he regarded as of Imperial importance. "Are you certain," he asked, "whether or not it is one of which will depend the future of the Empire, as well as its position among the nations" of the world. He ventured to prophesy that the year 1911 will be enumerated among the great anniversaries of Empire, that generations to come would regard the Canadian elections as an event which has settled for all time the future course of Empire. The Express says Premier Asquith will be elevated to the Peers before the opening of 1912 session of Parliament and that Mr. Lloyd George will become leader in the House of Commons.

In the Hands of Rebels

Special Evening Telegram. SHANGHAI, To-day.

The British Consul is in receipt of a telegram from Hankow, stating that news had been received that Chang Sha in Huan Province and Chang in Hu Peh Province, are in the hands of rebels.

least difference in treatment would mean the violation of neutrality.

It would be impossible for any Dominion of the Empire—Canada as little as South Africa—to remain neutral without cutting itself "asunder" from the Empire. It was impossible for one portion of the Empire to go to war while another remained neutral. South Africa to-day was in a position of total helplessness. Therefore the Government would establish a defence force at the earliest moment to relieve the Empire as much as possible of the task of defending the country.

"Should the unhappy day ever dawn," said General Botha, "when the common Fatherland is attacked, Dutch and English Afrikaners will be found shoulder to shoulder, defending the Fatherland to the very last." (Prolonged cheers.)
