

First Mate's Body Found in Lake.

John Buck of S. D. Warriner Believed to Have Died From Accidental Drowning—May Have Fallen in Water While Trying to Climb Ladder From Coal Dock to Outside of Ore Dock. Inquest This Evening.

John D. Buck, first mate of the barge S. D. Warriner, is believed to have drowned about 10.30 Wednesday evening at the point where the South Shore ore dock No. 5 joins Pickard's coal dock. He had been up town and was returning to his boat which lay at the ore dock.

Early in the evening he and several others from the crew went ashore and came up town where they made a few small purchases. He was last seen about nine o'clock in the evening by his companions when he went to one of the picture shows. Later that night he was seen alone by one of the

city police at the corner of Front and Barrage avenue as he was heading down the hill for his boat.

It is uncertain as to the manner in which he met his death but it is very probable that it was accidental. At the point where the dry dock joins the coal dock there is a ladder about six feet long to climb from the coal dock to the outside of the ore dock. It is thought that he attempted to climb this to get to his boat instead of going down the walk in the center of the dock. The slats of the ladder are very irregular and it is probable that he missed his footing and fell into the water about twelve feet below. A boat, which is used for repairing the boats was tied at this point and he probably struck this in his fall, because he suffered a severe cut behind the ear. His eyesight was very poor and he had a crippled leg due to a fall on one of the docks here recently this summer. It is thought that both of these may have been the cause for the accident as he was

never known to have been intoxicated.

Early Thursday morning he was missed by the crew and it was thought that he might have remained up town. A search was made and they failed to find him. The captain searched along the interior of the dock, thinking that possibly he might have fallen in there, but the body was not found. The Captain and the body were taken to the morgue. The body was taken to the morgue and the life saving crew was called. However before they arrived, one of the crew of the barge saw a pair of shoes protruding from under the float which was tied to the dock and a pike pole was procured and the body was pulled from the water. There are no evidences of foul play.

Mr. Buck comes from Cleveland and is very well known on the lakes and also in Marquette. The death is particularly sad because of the fact that he leaves two boys about twelve years of age. His wife died several years ago.

A jury was impaneled by Coroner Cray and the inquest was begun this morning but it was adjourned because they were unable to procure an important witness. It is thought a verdict of accidental death will be given. The body was taken to Cleveland by his brother who is also employed on the boat. He was 51 years of age—Michigan, U. S. A. papers.

Cable News.

Special Evening Telegram. LONDON, Oct. 17. War to-day became general throughout the Balkan Peninsula. Turkey which for a week or more had been fighting Montenegro, this morning issued a formal declaration of hostilities against Serbia and Bulgaria. For some reason, Greece was not mentioned in the official document delivered to the Serbian and Bulgarian legations at Constantinople, and the Grecian ministers, however, left Athens without the usual formalities. It is also announced that fighting between the Gulf of Arta and the Sea. In doing so, they had a sharp duel with the Turkish forts. In her declaration of war, Turkey places the blame on Bulgaria and Serbia, whose recent actions, she says, forced her to take this decisive step, though she was desirous of peace. Turkey's withdrawal of her troops from the immediate vicinity of the Greek frontier, and the omission of Greece in the declaration of war were, doubtless, dictated by Kiamel Pasha, President of the Council of State and the real head of the Turkish Government. He has been desirous all along, of avoiding a fight with Greece, whose interests, as he recently told the Greek Premier, are identical with those of Turkey. He also desired to cede the Island of Crete to Greece.

Special Evening Telegram. LONDON, Oct. 17. A suffragette cleavage is revealed by the announcement that Mr. and Mrs. Pethick Lawrence, who have been in the union with which Mrs. and the Misses Pankhurst are identified, have broken away from the organization. The cause is not revealed, but Mrs. Pankhurst, who made this announcement, says that the association of the Pethick Lawrences with the control of the organization, ceased, owing to different views concerning its policy. The suffragette organ, "Votes for Women," remains in the hands of Mr. and Mrs. Lawrence, but the Women's Social Political Union, will bring out another paper, entitled "The Suffragette," with Miss Pankhurst as Editor.

Special Evening Telegram. ATHENS, Oct. 17. A daring feat was accomplished this morning by the commanders of the Greek gunboats. At 2 o'clock they made a dash to force the Turkish blockade at the narrow entrance to the Gulf of Arta, which is held by Turkish and the other Greek. They were observed from the Turkish fort at Preveza, which dominates the entrance, and a heavy fire was directed on them, which they returned. They succeeded in fighting their way through, and at half past four reached the southern shore, but with very little damage.

Special Evening Telegram. LONDON, Oct. 17. The official announcement to-day of a 5 per cent. Bank of England discount rate was the natural outcome of the refusal by the Bank of England to discount bills below that level. Owing to the abnormal difference between the money market and the discount rate, as well as the Balkan war, and actual prospective gold demands from India, which country is the latest addition to the list of gold seekers, the rate has already been discounted by the stock market, but short loans will probably stiffen it a result.

Special Evening Telegram. GIBRALTAR, Oct. 17. An escort of four Greek destroyers conveying the Greek steamer "Macedonia" with a number of Greek Bulgarians and Serbians aboard, who are returning from America to join their regiments in a fight against the Turks. She carries also a large cargo of ammunition. The "Macedonia" arrived here last night from New York, and four destroyers, recently purchased by Greece in England, waiting to accompany her on her voyage.

Special Evening Telegram. ST. PETERSBURG, Oct. 17. Russia has adjourned the sentence of banishment to Siberia, by the serving of the same punishment in the penitentiaries of European Russia. The authorities recognize that the dumping of convicts in Siberia is seriously hampering the development of the country.

Special Evening Telegram. LONDON, Oct. 17. The British Cabinet held a long session this morning to discuss the French proposal of a Conference of the Powers. It was also said that the British Government were supporting the efforts being made to raise a Turkish loan in London, but this was denied at the Foreign Office.

Special Evening Telegram. BELGRADE, Oct. 17. Two hundred Serbian tribesmen were killed this morning in a battle with the Serbian troops on the frontier, near Friepolis in the northern part of the Sanjak of Novibazar. The tribesmen were attacked, but were repulsed by the Serbians. King Peter left to-day for the front.

Special Evening Telegram. LONDON, Oct. 17. The Wellington, New Zealand, correspondent of the Times, states that the Defence Bill, yesterday, practically became law, having passed the Committee stage, unaltered. The principle of compulsory service went unchallenged.

Special to Evening Telegram. HALIFAX, Oct. 17. A despatch from Ottawa, Justice Drysdale, of Halifax, has been appointed local Judge in Admiralty of the Exchange Court of Nova Scotia, in succession to the late H. J. McDonald.

Special Evening Telegram. NORWICH, Conn. Oct. 17. The woolen mills of Lucas and Co. at Poppletonuck, were burned to-day. The loss is estimated at \$50,000.
