### Days of Suspense.

These are days of suspense. Little news is to hand on some momentous matters. While the allies are holding their own, at least, on the Western front, little information is coming of the activity of the Germans in the Baltic against Russian forts, nor do we hear much of the position of affairs in Galicia. The experience of the past has however shown that when the Russians have had a setback, they have always retreated for a new spring forward, which has invariably proved a costly operation to their opponents. In the operations against Turkey, particularly in the Dardanelles, almost all the news comes from Greece. In the past however Greek news has proved anything but reliable. The news from this source gives accounts of success which we fear are too rosy to be reliable. The difficulties of both the land and sea operations are most formidable. So far the progress has been slow and costly, but not more so than was expected by the authorities. The reasons for reticence on the part of the latter are doubtless sound and in the interests of the success of the operations. Before long we shall probably get reliable news as to the progress actually made. The progress in making up the new National Cabinet is also slow. Cabinet talking from one political party is always a ticklish business, and the difficulties must be intensified in making one up to represent the whole country. The Italian Senate by a practically unanimous vote has followed the course of the House of Deputies and is backing up Premier Salandra and his Cabinet. All this is understood to toll for war, and all the indications point in the same direction, but at the time of writing there is no news of an actual declaration of war, nor any authentic news of any outbreak of war. ### Supreme Court.

The Court met after recess yesterday afternoon and the hearing of the case Winter vs. the Government of Newfoundland was concluded. # LATEST From the Front.

### 10.00 A.M.

#### ITALIAN MOUNTAINEERS READY.

UNDRINE, Italy, To-day. From the Alps which is still covered with snow, the air Forests down to the sea where the grape vines form miles of festoons, the whole vast region has been transformed into a huge military camp. Everywhere are tents, gun carriages and flags. At all points on this section intense excitement marks the military camp. Italian army officers have great difficulty in restraining soldiers from crossing the frontier. The troops are made anxious to fight as are the Alpine soldiers who are of the same type as the French Alpine Chasseurs. These men number about 100,000. They have been chosen from among the strongest and bravest mountaineers. They are commanded by a selected set of officers that know all the secrets of the snow-capped boundaries. Alpine troops occupy all the passes, their motto being: "No admittance through here."

### 11.15 A.M.

#### CABINET NOT YET MADE UP.

LONDON, To-day. The new Cabinet makeup will not be announced until Monday or Tuesday. The appointment thus far made known is that of Arthur Henderson, Laborite, who will assume the Portfolio of President of the Executive Government Board. We have followed Roman example, says the Spectator. We have named a Dictator, but have put Dictatorship in a commission until the war is over. There must and will be no thought of who is a Liberal and who is a Unionist, or what Liberal or Unionist element in the Cabinet desire. The administration will have but one thought or aim, the saving of the nation and the destruction of the enemy. There are three immediate practical things to be considered, the Spectator adds: First, more rapid provision of munitions of war; second, a supply of men which can be obtained only by compulsory service; and third, to see that the war policy is clear and well defined and involves no wastage of efforts. The newspaper proposes an inner Cabinet composed of the Premier, the Foreign Secretary, the Foreign, War and Navy Ministers to manage the war. The Pall Mall Gazette, defending Kitchener, says the national and personal qualities of Kitchener are invaluable supports to the nation at home and abroad. He was invited to join the Cabinet, and give up his splendid work in Egypt. He did not thrust himself upon the Cabinet. The country will not suffer indignity and insult to be heaped upon him.

#### WILL ISSUE PROCLAMATION.

ROME, To-day. King Victor Emmanuel will issue a proclamation to the people, countersigned by all Ministers to-day, which will explain how Italy had been driven to take up arms, and will explain how Italy appeals to all citizens to do their duty in such a way that victory will be assured.

#### THIRTY-SIX HOUR BOMBARDMENT.

LONDON, To-day. A despatch from Athens states it is reported from Mytilene that the British squadron on Thursday effected a 36-hour bombardment of Turkish troops, concentrated near Kara Barua, near Smyrna.

### 1.45 P.M.

#### CHAMBER OF DEPUTIES MEET.

PARIS, To-day. The Temps publishes a telegram from Rome, despatched at 3 o'clock in which the correspondent says all the galleries of the Chamber of Deputies were crowded at one o'clock. Some time before Parliament reassembled there were 450 deputies in their seats. Only one incident marked the opening session, that was when Garfield Annunzio entered the gallery all the deputies stood up and shouted, "Viva D'Annunzio, viva Italy. D'Annunzio is known for his very radical stand in favor of war. Two or three Socialist members protested against this ovation but their voices were lost in cheering. Signor Marcora, President of the Chamber, took his place at 3 o'clock. All members of the House and everybody in the galleries stood up to acclaim the old follower of Garibaldi; then Premier Salandra, followed by all members of the Cabinet, entered. It was a solemn moment, then a delirium of cries broke out. Cheering lasted for five minutes. Premier Salandra appeared to be much moved by the demonstration, and after the formalities of the opening, Premier Salandra arose and said: Gentlemen, I have the honour to present to you a bill to meet eventual expenditures of a national war. Prolonged applause followed this announcement. The Premier began an exposition on the situation of Italy before the opening of hostilities. In Europe, he declared, Italy submitted to every humiliation

from Austria-Hungary for love of peace, but by her ultimatum to Serbia, the Premier said, Austria had annulled the equilibrium of the Balkan and provoked the attention of the world. Notwithstanding this violation of the treaty of the Triple Alliance, Italy endeavored during the long months to avoid war; but these efforts were bound to have a limit in time and dignity. This is why the Government felt itself forced to present its denunciation to the Triple Alliance on May fourth, said Premier Salandra. These declarations were received with great applause, which the Premier tried to limit. When he had succeeded in so doing, he said: Italy must be united at this moment when her destinies are being decided. These words were greeted with a renewal of applause, deputies and spectators arising. When quiet was restored Premier Salandra exclaimed: We have confidence in our august chief who is preparing to lead an army for the glorious future. Let us gather around this well beloved sovereign. It was observed the Socialists took part in the applause. Premier Salandra then proposed that a committee of eighteen deputies should examine the bill composed of a single article which he presented. The committee follows: The Government is authorized in case of war and during duration of war to make decisions with due authority of law in every respect required for the defence of the State and guarantee public order. Urgent economic and national necessity provisions contained in article 243 to 251 of the military code continue in force. The Government is authorized to have recourse until December 31st, 1915, to monthly supplementary appropriations for balancing the budget. The bill shall come into force the day it is passed.

### 2.15 P.M.

#### RELEASES ITALY.

PARIS, To-day. It is considered Austria's action in destroying bridges, cutting telegraph lines at Ponte Caffara and Lodrone, to be held to constitute a casus belli making Italy free to open hostilities without further diplomatic formalities, says a despatch from Turin.

#### FORTY SOLDIERS KILLED; 300 INJURED.

CARLISLE, England, To-day. A train carrying troops bound south, collided with a local train this morning, on the Caledonian railway near here. Forty soldiers were killed and 300 injured.

#### AUSTRIANS RETREATING.

PARIS, To-day. The right wing of the Austrian Army in Bukowina are retreating towards the Carpathians, according to a despatch from Bucharest, filed on Thursday. The Austrian rear-guard is reported to be making desperate efforts to cover retreat and check the Russian offensive.

#### COMMUNICATIONS THREATENED.

LONDON, To-day. The Kaiser's army in Galicia is today reported to have been flanked as a result of a strong Russian offensive in extreme Southern Poland. The Germans have been driven from Opatow back to Iwaniska, and this position has been successfully driven home will put the Russians to the rear of the German advance threatening their communications.


