### Speech Day.

Last night at the Casino the annual distribution of prizes for Bishop Spencer and Bishop Field College was held under the patronage of His Lordship Bishop White, the attendance being large.

In his opening remarks His Lordship pointed out how that the influenza had caused considerable delay in the annual speech day and that as this curtailed the time at the disposal of both pupil and tutor, the yearly play had been abandoned, while it had also been thought preferable to combine the two colleges for the occasion.

Mr. Dunfield, Secy. of Spencer College then read the yearly report of that school, pointing out how that the year past, had been one of satisfactory progress, and referred to the Exhibition held by that college in February last, and also to the re-establishment of a suitable boarding house for outport girls, desirous of attending college.

The prizes for the Spencer girls were then presented by His Lordship. Mr. R. R. Wood, Headmaster of Bishop Field College now read his report. He referred to the influenza epidemic and its attendant effects. He emphasized that that now was the time for action in Education. He spoke of the years' work as having been satisfactory, as it had been a year of peculiar difficulties. The Semi-Military system had been adopted and was beneficial. In athletics the boys, if not winners, had shown themselves fighters. He hoped that some suitable memorial would be erected to the Old Fellidians who died for King and country, and said that even as Education was increasing elsewhere so should it here. Distribution of prizes to Bishop Field boys now took place. His Lordship presenting.

Dr. Blackall, being asked to speak, spoke of the combination of the two colleges as arguing well for the future. He dwelt upon the need of Education in Newfoundland as shown by the number of illiterates. He mentioned gratefully the generosity of the people who supported the college. He spoke very highly of the "Job" Scholarship, which being almost equal to \$300.00 is paid the most successful boy of the Junior Associate Class in Field College (certain conditions being carried out) and also promised a scholarship given by himself in memory of his son Herbert, who made the supreme sacrifice.

A vote of thanks was proposed to His Lordship by Sir Joseph Outerbridge and seconded by Mr. Withers, who in his remarks pleaded for more science, and higher ideals and more progressiveness in our educational policy.

His Lordship in reply pointed out

that during the last twenty five years Newfoundland had progressed, but there's room for further advance, and more should be done. He hoped that next year a play or something similar may be provided. The National Anthem closing the evening.

We take this opportunity of extending our congratulations to the teachers and directors of both colleges for the good work done, as shown in the prize list appended, and we also tender our sincere congratulations to the pupils who have been the fortunate recipients of the prizes especially A. Perlin on being the first boy to win the Job Scholarship. To those who did not secure a prize, we would point out the goal ahead and the chances still present for doing better next year. We wish them that satisfaction.
