"THE STORY OF THE AERIAL
SURVEY IN THE WILDS
OF LABRADOR."

of Assembly to see to its interests?
In this age of boasted enlightenment,
surely "no representation, no tax-
ation" must be dear to all hardy
tollers whether on land or sea.

It is amusing, too, to see the Medi-
cal Missionary, Dr. Grenfell, there
with his "ice-cream and fireworks."
In the face of the terrible sufferings
and privations of last winter, the
wonder grows how long more will
Newfoundland and Labrador be the
sport of adventurers.

Nfld. Scotch

Cured Herring.

The market for Newfoundland
Scotch cured herring is displaying
some signs of increasing strength.
1919 large winters being quoted vari-
ously at \$14 @15, with mediums sell-
ing around \$12@14—equal quantities
of each size to accompany all orders.
No arrivals of Scotch cure have been
reported during the past week, and
the market is maintaining a firm
tone. The outlook for the herring
fishery in Notre Dame Bay, Bay of Is-
lands, and Bonne Bay the coming sea-
son is said to be very gloomy. A
large quantity of last year's pack is
held unsold in storage in New York,
and it is estimated that about 4,000
or 5,000 barrels are being stored in
Newfoundland.—N.Y. Fishing Gazette,
Nov. 1.

Dried Fish.

The longshoremen's strike is, of
course, the greatest concern of the
dried fish exporters at the present
time, and every one is wondering just
how much longer it will be before
they can start in to clean up the ac-
cumulation of orders now on hand.
Porto Rico is demanding fish, and
recent advices from San Juan indi-
cate only scant arrivals from Lunen-
burg, with no shipments coming in
from New York. These light arrivals
are reported as going into immediate
consumption at Porto and subsidiary
markets while San Juan stocks are
rapidly diminishing. Although simi-
lar conditions prevail in the Havana
market with respect to arrivals, the
demand has not materially improved,
and prices remain unchanged. Just
what sort of conditions will prevail
here when the longshoremen's strike
comes to an end (if it ever does) is a
matter for considerable speculation,
and exporters are loath to venture an
opinion as to the probable outcome.
Prices remain on a level with last
week's quotations. — N. Y. Fishing
Gazette, Nov. 1.
