LIST OF GERMANY'S OBLIGATIONS EXTENSIVE.

LONDON, June 5.
Germany's failures to carry out the
disarmament requirements of the
Versailles Treaty were outlined in de-
tail in the note the Allied Powers have
presented to the German Government,
the text of which was made public
here to-day. The note was handed to
Chancellor Luther in Berlin yesterday
morning by Baron D'Abernon, the
British Ambassador, representing the
Council of Ambassadors. Germany
must comply with an extensive list of
restrictions and demands before the
disarmament obligations of the Peace
Treaty are considered fulfilled, and which it is washed.


