The Speech from the Throne. It was scarcely expected by the general public that any business except that relating to the Pacific Scandal would be brought before Parliament at its present session The session is a special one, owing its existence entirely to the promise of the Governor-General that the people's representatives should have an opportunity of pronouncing upon the Scandal as soon as the Royal Commission had concluded its proceedings.

We find, however, that Parliament is also invited to consider a Representation Bill, an additional Assistance (Administration) Bill, a Court of Appeals Bill, an Insolvency Bill, a Board of Trade Bill, and other

In thus deciding to make the session one for general business, we wonder how much the Government were influenced by the necessity of making the Speech of a decent and presentable length. The Pacific Scandal is an exceedingly awkward subject to handle in a Speech from the Throne. Half a dozen lines com-prises all that is said about it, but there is great significance in these few words, arising from what is left unsaid as well as what is actually spoken. There is no attempt whatever, either directly or by implication, to express an opinion of the innocence of the Ministry—and we may be sure that Sir John A. would have been only too glad to have the benefit of so powerful a point in his favour as would have been some exonerating observations in the Speech. But Lord Dufferin has evidently vetoed anything of the kind. Notice,

Riel was in the imperial Government, referred to yesterday, as confirming the action of the governor-general, was laid before the House of Commons yesterday, and a portion of it is printed in the morning papers; but its great length precludes our commenting on it to day. It must be borne in mind, however, that it may clear Lord Dufferin on the technical correctness of his action, without in the least justifying the course pursued by the Dominion Government. there is great significance in these favour as would have been some exonerating observations in the Speech. But Lord Dufferin has evidently vetoed anything of the kind. Notice, too, the mild and humble way in which the possibility is expressed that the Commissioners' report may be of some use to the House. Could anything show more clearly the utter superfluity of the Commission? What a lame and impotent conclusion! Parliamentary representatives with the timid remark that it will be for them to determine whether it can be of any assistance to them! There is something exceeding ludicrous in the idea.

The Speech announces also the surrender of the Pacific Railway Charter by Sir Hugh Allan's Company, and the consequent gnominious failure of the Government in an important feature of their policy. Try, try again, is however the motto, and we are kindly promised another scheme for constructing the railway. The details of this new attempt will be awaited with considerable interest. After the John A. Government has tried and failed in this great undertaking a few more times, there may be some chance of the construction of the railway being undertaken in a practical and sensible manner. But it is to be hoped that Parliament or the country will cut short the new John A. Pacific scheme and the life of the Administration together.

Our Public Schools.

We lately had one of the High School Inspectors, J. McLellan, Esq. I.L.D., in our town on a tour of in opection of High and Public Schools. He visited our High School and

spent a whole day in examining into the mode of instruction pursued in that institution and the scholarship of the pupils. He also visited the public schools and noted the way in which instruction is imparted therein. The Doctor was much pleased with the proficiency and attainments of the pupils of the High School, and in a few remarks which he made at the close of his examination took occasion to vindicate the character of the school against some injuriou reports that were put into circula tion a year ago concerning it. He said that his remarks at that time had reference to the poor qualifications of some pupils who had then lately entered the institution from other schools, and for whose efficiency the High School was in no way responsible. He did not know that his remarks would be published, or he wouldhave given thewhole of the report as he made it to the Education Officein Toronto, as it showed the High School to be on a par with others in the Province for efficiency of in struction

The Inspector was not all pleased with the smallness of the number of and stated that there must be some mismanagement in the Public Schools

It certainly does appear a little strange that out of some 1,300 pupils attending our Public Schools, only about 25 should be found in the High School, and that this school, the highest seat of learning our town possesses, has not to-day, nor has it had for some time, one solitary ool sending up pupils to it. We believe the proper authorities are fully equal to the duty of remedying no doubt but that whatever is necessary will be done to place all our schools upon the right basis.
