CHICAGO, Oct. 28.—Hogs—Estimated receipts today, 28,000; left over, 5,000; quiet; weak to shade lower than yesterday. Light, \$3.50 to \$3.75; mixed, \$3.50 to \$3.75; heavy, \$3.25 to \$3.50; rough, \$3.25 to \$3.50.

Cattle—Receipts, 9,500, including 600 Texans and 2,500 westerns; steady to strong; heavy, \$2.90 to \$3.25; cows and heifers, \$2 to \$4.50; Texas steers, \$2.75 to \$3.25; westerns, \$2.25 to \$3.40; calves, \$2.25 to \$3.40; sheep, \$2.25 to \$3.40.

Sheep—Receipts, 15,000; steady to strong.

MONTREAL, Oct. 28.—There were about 500 head of butchers' cattle, 20 calves, 1,800 sheep and lambs and 60 store hogs and pigs offered for sale today.

End abattoir today. The butchers were present in large numbers, and trade was fair, but the prices were had a downward tendency all round.

Beef was sold at from 23½c to 46c per lb., very few bringing over 35c per lb.; pretty good stock sold at from 30c to 40c per lb.

EAST BUFFALO, N. Y., Oct. 28.—Cattle—Receipts, only 2 cars, which were composed of fair to good mixed butchers' stock, and were taken at about steady prices.

Calves and Calves—Receipts, 75 head; the market was slow and generally weaker, with but few sales over \$6 to \$7 for good to choice; common to fair, \$5 to \$6.

Hogs—Receipts, 25 cars; there was a fairly active demand at the opening, and prices all ruled strong to a good extent, but weakened fully 50c per cwt before noon on light grades and York-shires, and the medium and good heavy grades held about steady, good to choice Yorkers, \$3.97 to \$4.17; mixed packers' grades, \$3.50 to \$3.97; medium weights, \$3.50 to \$3.97; heavy, \$3.50 to \$3.97; roughs, \$3.50 to \$3.97; stags, \$2.75 to \$3.25; pigs, \$2.25 to \$3.40.

Sheep and Lambs—Receipts, 25 cars, 17 of which were Canadian lambs, about all of which arrived after the noon hour; the market for good native lambs opened very quiet, but for the best fat selected ewe and wether lots prices were without material change, but the tone of the trade was weak and only the tops sold early, and they brought within 10c per cwt of former prices; the early sales of Canadian lambs were at \$4.50 to \$5.00, but the latter sales were all of the lower, the bulk of these selling at \$4.50 to \$5.00, with culls and common buckley lots at \$4.00 to \$4.50; lambs, yearlings, choice to prime, \$4.65 to \$4.90; fair to good, \$4.25 to \$4.50; culls to common yearlings, \$3.50 to \$4.00; native lambs, choice to extra choice, \$3.60 to \$5.75; fair to good, \$3.25 to \$3.50; culls to common, \$2.50 to \$3.50; native sheep, choice to selected wethers, \$4.50 to \$4.65; good to choice mixed, \$4.10 to \$4.35; common to fair, \$3.50 to \$3.85; culls to common, \$2.50 to \$3.25; export ewes to prime wethers, \$3.75 to \$4.50.

Dairy Markets.

KINGSTON, Ont., Oct. 28.—At the Frontenac cheese board today 3,800 boxes were boarded; no sales. The cheese existing between the buyers and sellers remains unchanged, and there is every possibility of the space widening. Today the highest bid made was 8½c, without any takers. Some salesmen asked as high as 8c, but others said they would be satisfied with 8½c. The matter of shipping direct to England was again discussed, but no decision was arrived at.

Many Casualties.

A Winnipeg Woman Takes Too Much Sleeping Medicine.

Fatally Kicked by a Horse—Died from Shock—Fell Dead.

Flesherton, Oct. 28.—While at a threshing machine, McLean's farm, near Brewster's Lake, Osprey, a boy, twelve years old, son of Jacob Loughead, was kicked in the face and knocked senseless. His 18-year-old sister, who witnessed the accident, carried the boy home, and then fell senseless herself from nervous exhaustion. The boy is recovering, but the shock was too much for the sister, and she died.

Chatsworth, Oct. 28.—Francis Muir, an aged gentleman, who had been living with his son-in-law, Samuel Howey, near Holland, met with a terrible death. Men were engaged in working a stoning machine, and Mr. Muir was standing the rope which was raising a large stone. In some way the rope came off the machine and struck Mr. Muir with great force, smashing his arm into a pulp. The shock proved too much for him, and he died 24 hours after the accident.

Hamilton, Oct. 28.—James Watson, 66 Florence street, was shot by the accidental discharge of a Remington-Union turner home from duck shooting on the bay. The charge struck his right arm below the shoulder, tearing open the flesh and exposing the muscles. He was removed to the city hospital.

Richardson, a prominent resident of the village of Stony Creek, dropped dead while walking along the street in the village yesterday morning. Heart failure was the cause of the death. He was 40 years of age and unmarried.

Winnipeg, Oct. 28.—Mrs. Georgia Wilson, wife of Mr. Thos. Wilson, Thursday died from an overdraught of sleeping medicine.

Quebec, Oct. 28.—Yesterday No. 1 train on the Lower Laurentian road, ran into some cattle one and a half miles south of St. Tit's station, and the engine and train were wrecked. Piche, who hails from Deschambault, was killed. Driver Gervais had a leg broken, among other injuries. Brakeman Piche is also badly hurt.

Hamilton, Oct. 28.—Mr. Lafayette Lowden, of Bimbrook, is very low and hopes for recovery at the residence. Monday night he was kicked by a horse. The shoe cut his stomach, and injured him internally.
