Great Britain has a long lead in the export of bicycles. In the month of July last alone, over \$5,000,000 worth of wheels was sent abroad from that busy country.

One year ago, this week, the first electric railway car was run in this city. Who is there among us who would like to return to the old snail-at-the-gallop horse car service?

Creamery butter is being shipped from Illinois to Japan. With the splendid steamship service of the C. P. R., this is a market which the dairymen of Western Canada ought to capture. By the way, the Japs keep no cows.

In writing to an ex-mayor of Ottawa, the Marquis of Lorne makes a very complimentary reference to Mr. Laurier as the new Prime Minister. The ex-Governor-General was always an admirer of the Liberal leader.

Hon. Sydney Fisher, Dominion Minister of Agriculture, has been on an official visit to the Toronto Exhibition. The Minister will not see the agricultural resources of the country at their best if he fails to visit the Western Fair in this city.

Mr. Balfour, Conservative leader in the Imperial House of Commons, boasts that he never reads the newspapers. Now we know why he proved so great a failure in the session which closed last month. He was out of touch with everybody. He did not know where he was at.

It is announced that the arrangements for the new service between Belgium and Canada, which have been completed between the Belgium Steamship Company and the Canadian Government, contemplate a direct service between Canada and Antwerp, via Boulogne. A substantial increase of trade may be looked for.

Canadians Carry Everything Before Them.

Canadians take second place to no people on the face of the earth where brain and muscle tell. This year the record of triumphs in the field of many athletic sports has been phenomenal. The record to date is as follows:

Half-raters (boating) championship of America and Sewauhaka cup, won by Glencairn, of Montreal, at Oyster Bay, L. I.

Kolapore Cup, won by Canadian rifle team at Bisley.

Queen's Cup, won by Canadian artillery team at Shoeburyness.

Senior four-oared championship of the United States, won by Winnipeg four at Saratoga, N. Y.

International yachting championship, won by the Canada, of Toronto, with a Hamilton commander, at Toledo.

Caledonian athletic championship of the world, won by Gideon Perrie, Brussels, Ont., at Pitlochry, Scotland, on Saturday last.

International cricket championship, at Philadelphia, on Monday.

Rowing championship of the world, won by Gaudaur at Putney, England, on Monday.

If there is any branch of athletic sport in which Canadians have not shown that they are equal, or superior, to any nationality in the world, let it be mentioned, and we doubt not that representative sons of the Dominion will be ready for the fray.

This country is so situated that it is capable of producing a race of men and women with powers of endurance and physical and mental cultivation unsurpassed in modern times. While we rejoice that our young men can go forth into the world, and take first place wherever they choose, we prefer to regard this capability as a proof, not that our people are running to athletics as a means of earning a livelihood, but that Canada is a land of robust manhood and womanhood, capable of equipping all who make their homes within its wide bounds with every physical and mental aid to success.

There is something in the air and in the surroundings of this fertile Northland which produces the best men and women, the best cattle, the best horses, the best sheep, the best wheat, the best barley, the best oats, the best apples, the best plums, that are to be found the world wide over.

With such advantages, why should we not progress?

North Oxford.
The seat in the Legislature vacated by Sir Oliver Mowat will be filled by an able man. Yesterday's bye-election resulted in the selection of Mr. Andrew Patullo, of Woodstock, as member for the riding. The Conservatives did not put up a man, but cast their influence generally with Dr. Adams, who ran as an Independent; but the electors endorsed the choice of the Liberal convention by an unusually large majority. Mr. Patullo has served the country in many important capacities. As a newspaper man he has interests in both town and country, and he can be relied on to make a model representative.

The Majority.
In an article on the recent session of the Imperial Parliament, in the September number of the North American Review, Justin McCarthy, the historian, says that in the ordinary course of affairs a British Minister thinks a steady majority of 30 a very satisfactory possession—a steady majority of 50 something to be proud of.

That is in the British House of Commons, which has a total membership of 670.

In the Dominion House of Commons, the total membership is 213, and interest naturally exists over the first test division in the new Parliament. There have been many wagers throughout the new country that the majority supporting Premier Laurier on the first vote of want of confidence would be less than 25, and many more that it would not be over 30. Those who have so supported their views with cash are, our Ottawa correspondent asserts, doomed to disappointment.

In the division which takes place tonight on Mr. Foster's want of confidence motion, condemning the Government for obtaining the Governor-General's sanction to the expenditure of money to pay those employed by the country—necessitated by the bungling of the late Administration—it is now conceded that Premier Laurier will have a majority of at least 33, and possibly 35.

When the election courts have decreed bye-elections in a number of constituencies now held by Opposition members, it is believed that the Government majority will be considerably augmented.

The country has decided to give the new Administration a fair chance to show how well it can govern during the next five years.

Is Emancipation in Sight?

Turkey owes the Christian nations of Europe over \$750,000,000. The annual interest on that sum is not a mere trifle. Some argue that if Turkey's misrulers were sent about their business, this indebtedness would be wiped out, and the bondholders would suffer. Not necessarily.

When Great Britain took hold of Egypt, the land of the Nile was loaded down with debt, and the rapacious Turkish masters of the felahs collected taxes twice a year—once for the taskmasters and once for the bondholders. Great Britain emancipated the cultivators of the soil from the clutches of the unscrupulous tax collectors, and gave industry a chance.

Today the Egyptians are prosperous and contented, and dishonest tax collectors are unknown. Were a like condition of affairs established in Turkey, the creditors of the nation would not suffer, the people would be relieved of many burdens that now bend them to the ground, and there would be life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness for every subject.

Is it too much to hope that the day of relief will soon dawn?

The Anglican Synod

Declines to Adopt the Revised Version of the Bible

Anonymous Gift of \$2,500 for the Algoma Mission Fund.

Winnipeg, Sept. 8.—The Friday and Saturday sessions of the General Synod were almost entirely taken up in discussing a resolution providing that Scripture lessons in the churches may be read from the revised version at such times as may be allowed by the ordinary. Dr. Clark spoke for an hour, and delivered an argument for the revised version, such as has never been heard before in Winnipeg.

Rev. J. C. Roper moved in amendment to refer the matter to the Upper House, asking their lordships to bring it before the approaching Lambeth conference. Both amendment and motion were negatived, the former by a vote of 25 to 44 against, and the latter by 33 for to 23 against.

A motion favoring the appointment of a joint committee to prepare and report an address to the Queen expressive of the affectionate loyalty and congratulations of General Synod on her having attained the 50th year of her reign, was carried.

Mr. Matthew Wilson read the report of the joint committee on memorials from the dioceses of Huron and Toronto regarding a rearrangement of the provinces and representation in the General Synod. The recommendation was to the effect that the General Synod, while not now originating legislation for the rearrangement of new ecclesiastical provinces in Ontario, if agreed upon by the provinces concerned.

A resolution of the Synod of the Diocese of Montreal, requesting that consideration be given to the question of the framing of a liturgy for the use of the Sunday schools of the Dominion, was read and referred to the committee on doctrine, worship and discipline.

Upon returning from the General Synod missionary meeting here Bishop Sullivan, of Algoma, opened a letter and found it contained a check for \$2,500, given anonymously by some friend of the diocese for the mission fund of Algoma.

Western Ontario.
A Postmaster and His Son Suspected of Incendiarism.
Essex Cattle Thieves Caught and Punished.

An attempt was made one night last week to fire Sandy McVean's flour mill in Dresden.

Ira Doolittle, one of the oldest residents of Malahide, died very suddenly last week.

The Berlin banks have decided to charge small depositors from 25 to 50 cents per month for handling their accounts.

Norman Munro has been appointed drum major of the Twenty-fifth Battalion, and James Sqaunce, sergeant of the Pioneer corps.

The distillery plant owned by P. Benetean in Windsor, and closed for the last year and a half, has been purchased by Hiram Walker & Co. Munro says it will be removed to Walkerville.

Mr. E. R. Lang's barn at Langford was destroyed by fire, and in consequence of information laid by him, Mr. Wm. Reid and his son Edward were arrested. Mr. Reid is the postmaster at Langford.

Harvey and Wm. Harrison and Joseph Cook, all colored men from the township of Rochester, were found guilty by Judge Horne at Sandwich on Friday of stealing cattle from Purvis Bros., E. Marenette and others, sent down for two years. John Taylor, a colored man from Colchester, pleaded guilty of stealing cattle from a neighbor, but was let go on suspended sentence on furnishing bail in the sum of \$1,000.

The committee appointed to arrange for the reception of Lord and Lady Aberdeen at Windsor have decided that the viceregal party and those invited to meet them should drive in carriages to Sandwich, and on their return there should be an informal reception at the Crawford House. At 11 o'clock they will start for Walkerville, a lunch being served aboard the yacht Pastime, which will be placed at their disposal.
