THIRTY-ONE CHILDREN BURNED. Granada, West Indies, Nov. 14.-A school building here, in which 150 children were present, has been burned, together with 31 children and a teacher. Two boys who had been severely punished by the teacher and suspended are believed to have fired the building. They have been arrested, but so far have not confessed.

PROTEST FROM TURKEY. Paris, Nov. 14.-The Turkish Embas-French press a protest against alleged misstatements contained in the newspapers here regarding Turkey, adding: 'The Government has been obliged to epress some local disturbances, which have no bearing on the general situation. 
