A dispatch from Vienna says that on Austrian initiative negotiations are passing between the powers with the object of forming an agreement that no single power shall undertake anything in the East independently of the others, and that all steps shall be taken jointly after the previous agreement.

CHINAMAN VS. CHRISTIAN.

London, Nov. 14.—Advices from the vicinity of Ningpo, in the province of Chekiang, that anonymous placards were recently posted in various places inviting the people to kill foreigners and native Christians, and to destroy the churches. The first effect of these incendiary documents was that two native Christians were beaten and others threatened with worse things. Happily before the mischief had time to grow the proclamations were brought by a foreigner to the notice of the prefect, who promptly issued a proclamation warning off doers and ordering the authorities to be on the alert.

A MURDERING MANIAC.

Paris, Nov. 14.—A wine merchant of this city, M. Domerque, has suddenly become violently insane and has already killed a number of people. He shot his wife and mother, and then opened fire upon people in the street, killing three of them and wounding several others. The madman then barricaded himself in his house and fired upon the gendarmes who surrounded the building.

THE CZARINA'S HEALTH.

London, Nov. 14.—A correspondent telegraphs from St. Petersburg that the health of the Czarina is normal. Her accouchement is expected towards the end of November. She has not suffered any operation.

ON TARIO HORSES SOLD.

London, Nov. 14.—At Aldridge's Repository yesterday 24 good-looking horses, belonging to McCain, of Lucknow, Ont., were disposed of at an average of 24 guineas, the highest, a skye-hair colt, bringing 31, and the lowest 18 guineas.

THIRTY-ONE CHILDREN BURNED.

Granada, West Indies, Nov. 14.—A school building here, in which 35 children were present, has been burned, together with 31 children and a teacher. Two boys who had been severely punished by the teacher and suspended are believed to have fired the building. They have been arrested, but so far have not confessed.

PROTEST FROM TURKEY.

Paris, Nov. 14.—The Turkish Embassy here has communicated to the French press a protest against alleged misstatements contained in the news papers here regarding Turkey, adding: "The Government has been obliged to repress some local disturbances, which have no bearing on the general situation. The Government will punish the offenders should the disturbances be renewed."

SUICIDE OF EIGHTEEN SPECULATORS.

London, Nov. 14.—The Chronicle prints a dispatch from its Paris correspondent, the claim being made that eighteen suicides have occurred at Paris and Lyons, which can be traced to despondency resulting from losses on the Bourse during the recent panic. The most prominent was that of M. Colombet, proprietor of the well-known Bank Colombet, at Chateaufort. M. Colombet shot his wife before killing himself.

RUSSIAN VIEWS.

St. Petersburg, Nov. 14.—Lord Salisbury's speech at the Guildhall has produced an electric effect here. It has brought about the universal expression of opinion that the powers must intervene with joint action in Turkey.

The Novosti, the best informed paper here, says: In order to avoid war, the powers must establish a protectorate over Turkey.

The Novoye Vremya says that Russia must be equal to the occasion, one of the necessities being the concentration of 60,000 troops at Erzerum to begin with.

RUSSIA NOT IN IT.

Berlin, Nov. 14.—A despatch from Constantinople to the Franfurter-Zeitung says that the Russian ambassador to Turkey, M. De Nelidoff, declares that Russia would not accept the proposal.

BEARDED THE EMPEROR.

Vienna, Nov. 14.—Dr. Lueger, the Anti-Semite leader in the Reichsrath, who was re-elected burgomaster on Oct. 29 last, and whose election Emperor Francis Joseph refused to sanction, was again re-elected burgomaster yesterday.

Dr. Friebel, president of the Imperial Council, then announced, on behalf of the lieutenant-governor, the dissolution of the civic council. The members of the council and were great and tremendous cheers outside. The police finally made several arrests and dispersed the gathering.

A mob of about 100 men afterwards entered the Imperial palace, shouting: "Long live Lueger!" and they forced their way into the palace grounds, from which they were ejected by the Life Guards.

HEALY'S REMOVAL.

London, Nov. 14.—There were 100 delegates present at the meeting of the Irish National Federation at Dublin yesterday, called to consider the resolution expelling Mr. T. M. Healy from the organization. It is a result of the charges of treachery which Mr. Healy made against the Irish Parliamentary party at the Nationalist convention at Omagh, County Tyrone, in July last, when he accused Mr. John Dillon of Tyrone of the same crime. The motion of Mr. Healy to admit representatives of the press to the meeting was rejected. Mr. Healy was recently removed for the same cause from membership in the executive committee of the Irish National League of Great Britain.

The meeting continued for hours, and the debate was extremely heated. A Limerick delegate, Mr. Lyndon, moved for the removal from the executive committee of Messrs. Healy, Arthur O'Connor and Fox, members of Parliament, and Murphy and Mooney. An amendment by Sir Thomas Esmonde, M.P., that the charges against Mr. Healy be a compromise, regarding the executive by a joint committee, was negatived, 48 to 42, and Mr. Lyndon's motion was carried, 45 to 40.

A FRENCH PROPHECY (?)

Paris, Nov. 14.—For the next 60 days the imminent danger of a general war will force apparent concurrence of all European powers in dealing with Turkey. Yet in that time, while Great Britain can do nothing but look on in dread, Russia will be ready, and before May the Sultan's empire will be forced into North Africa as a block to England in Egypt, but without really disturbing French territory on that continent. Russia will have absorbed Turkey in Asia and a part of Turkey in Europe, including Constantinople. The Dreibund is dead. In the rearrangement of the trade in the far East will be the divided spoils of the continental powers, to be followed by the

trade of southern Asia, where England's rule will be broken down, piece by piece. What has already been achieved makes a general combination of the continent against England a fixed certainty, and while the Turkish situation is holding the general attention the work in eastern Asia will have proceeded too far to be afterwards upset, for England, aside from being busy in the Mediterranean, will be alone.

LANGTRY'S LATEST.

London, Nov. 14.—Sir Robert Peel's projected marriage with Mrs. Langtry, which constituted her main object in instituting divorce proceedings in the United States, has been broken off. The bitter feeling between them may be judged from the fact that after Peel had got a wealthy German brother-in-law to advance \$50,000 to pay his debts, Mrs. Langtry put in a \$25,000 claim, which nearly upset all arrangements. The brother-in-law, however, put up \$15,000 more in order to pay the bill.

The dean of Jersey's daughter has a new titled swain in tow, the premier of the island, Lord Shrewsbury. He has become her racing partner, and the two are inseparable. They went to Paris the other day by special train, after winning close upon \$100,000 at Newmarket.

CABLE NOTES.

The officers of the Japanese legation here say that the rebellion in Formosa is over and that the Japs are ready to begin the evacuation of Port Arthur within two weeks.

A Melbourne dispatch says: Owing to the prolonged drought the wheat in the colonies will hardly supply the local demands. None will be available for export.

A Shanghai dispatch says that a German squadron has suddenly anchored near the island of Formosa, and intends to occupy the adjacent island of Quemoy as a coaling station.

It is expected that the decision of the Privy Council in the matter of Ontario's right to control the manufacture and traffic of liquors within the Province will be promulgated next week.

THE PAT POLITICAL.

Hon. Wilfrid Laurier speaks at a mass meeting of the electors of Jacques Cartier at St. Laurent tonight. This will be the last of his campaign.

A Montreal dispatch says: It is evident that the campaign in Cardwell is now on. Mr. Robert S. White, ex-M.P. for the county, left town this evening and Cardwell is said to be his destination.

The Patron convention for Center Wellington was held in Moorefield village on Wednesday, and was well attended. Mr. James Tucker, a farmer of Peel township, was the unanimous choice of the convention for the vacancy in the Legislature.

Sir Mackenzie Bowell says he does not know anything about the visit of Sir Wm. Whiteley, Premier of Newfoundland, to Ottawa.

It has come out how Mr. Curran was specially engaged by the Hon. Mackenzie Bowell that the vacancy in the Cabinet could not be filled so long as he was Solicitor-General. In other words, that he must be promoted to the vacancy, holding the position he did and representing a Quebec constituency as he did. If this was not admitted he threatened to resign and to appeal outside to his friends. The Premier was alarmed at the prospect, and Mr. Curran was shelved on the bench.

SHOLTO'S SIDE SHOW.

The Noble Lord Threatens to Shoot His Wife in a Theater.

Los Angeles, Cal., Nov. 14.—Lord Sholto Douglas last evening threatened to take the life of his wife. In the corridor of the Ardmore, at Sixth and Broadway, in highly-pitched tones and while laboring under great anger, he informed Lady Douglas that if she entered her mother's rooms he would shoot her. Lady Sholto was cool and collected while all this loud talk was being made, and she exactly what he told her not to do. She went to her mother's room and talked with her. Lord Douglas did not shoot her, nor did he make any attempt to.

At the usual hour Lady Sholto appeared at the stage door of the Grand Bank Theater with Mrs. Mooney, her mother. Shortly after, Lord Sholto turned up. As soon as he heard that Mrs. Mooney was inside he became greatly enraged. The manager told him to go and invite her to leave. He did so. Mrs. Mooney said she would stay. Manager Frawley then ordered Mrs. Mooney to leave the dressing room.

This was too much. Drawing herself up to her full height, Lady Sholto said with great dramatic power that, where her mother could not stay, she would not. The two women then left the theater. Lord Sholto, who had been prancing around behind the scenes, trailed them to the hotel, and then he evidently reconsidered his words. Hostilities ceased for the while.

FATAL COLLAPSE OF A FLY WHEEL.

Albany, N. Y., Nov. 14.—The monster 20-ton fly wheel in the power house of the Albany railway burst yesterday. Four men were seated in Meyer's saloon, across the street. One of the fragments of the wheel crashed through the wall of the saloon and struck them. John Piel was taken to a hospital, where he soon after died. Lewis Thuis, Chas. Meyer and John Faust were badly hurt. Thuis may die.

Another piece of the wheel, weighing two tons, flew across the heads and sides of Elizabeth Metz's residence, but injured no one. A 20-foot gap was made in the power house. The property loss will reach about \$50,000.

TERRIFIC COLLISION

Between Runaway Cars and a Fast Train.

Disaster Caused by Train Hands Going to Sleep—Several Lives Lost.

Bloomfield, N. J., Nov. 14.—A wreck occurred on the Philadelphia Railroad at Huxley, Union county, yesterday morning. The engineer is reported to have been killed, and several passengers are said to be hurt. A freight train from Summit, shortly after 5 o'clock bound for Port Norris, when the engine got nearly to the top of the hill a coupling pin broke, and the caboose and four freight cars
