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TRACK RECORD BROKEN

Ace Does a Fast Mile on the Closing Day of the London Races—London Ball Team Still Dropping Games—Latest Sporting News.

THE TURF

CLOSING DAY AT QUEEN'S PARK.
The three-day race meet of the London Trotting and Racing Association closed yesterday afternoon with the finest day's racing ever put on in this city. The promoters of the sport are to be congratulated on the eminently satisfactory manner in which every detail was carried out, and at the great success that has attended the meet in point of attendance and splendid list of entries. Yesterday the crowd numbered over 3,000, and all enjoyed the sport immensely. The attendance this year was far in advance of last season. In 1938, when the association put on the first meet, things looked anything but rosy for speeding in London. There was very little interest taken at that time, but through the energetic work of the association officers and members the meets in this city have at last taken on the right proportions, and after the present splendid meet the association should be liberally patronized in 1901. Next year the association will be favored with some of the speediest animals on the continent. The purses hung up for closing day amounted to \$1,350. The event of the day, the free-for-all, was won by Ace, Harry Simon's horse. Ace was a strong favorite, having made some pretty good records on the big tracks in Canada and the States. The speedy little beast was not in the pink of condition, but made the mile in 2:14, lowering the track record for a mile, made by himself two years ago, by one-quarter of a second. Mustapha captured the 2:30 trot, and Mamie Calan took the three-quarter mile run.

THE 2:30 TROT.

The first event was called shortly after 1 o'clock and drew a large length of the programme. Six horses started in the race. Nutspra was the favorite. In the opening heat he finished in sixth place, but in the three following heats he had no trouble in coming under the wire in first place. The summary:

Ace, the favorite, finished third in the first heat, and the time was 2:13. This was not fast enough for the judges, and the drivers were warned by Starter McIlroy that no such time as made in that heat would be allowed. In the second heat Ace was in third place until in the stretch, but when urged he stepped away from his rivals in good style, taking first place quite handsily. It was in this heat that the track record was broken. The time for the quarter was :34, half mile, 1:08, three-quarters, 1:41; mile, 2:14. The third heat fell easy to Ace, and in the fourth he was leading until the stretch, when he broke, and Charlie B. crossed under the wire in first place. Summary:

CAPITAL ECHOES

Commission to Investigate Election Frauds Will Meet Next Wednesday.

Ottawa, June 22.—The commission to investigate corrupt acts in bygone elections will hold a preliminary meeting for organization in Toronto on Wednesday next.

At a meeting of the emergency committee yesterday, William Moore testified to buying a tin of food from Lyon, Montreal, and giving it to Hatch. Milton Hersey testified to analyzing for Hatch, which showed 17.55 per cent of proteids. There was nothing materially new in evidence.

THE C. O. O. F.

Grand Lodge Discusses Changes in the Constitution.

Hamilton, Ont., June 21.—The grand lodge resumed its labors yesterday. Grand Master Clarke, in the chair.

The discussion of the proposed changes of the constitution was continued. The age limit was reduced from 49 to 45. The clauses relating to hazardous risks was under discussion for a considerable time. The definitions given of what might be hazardous were varied and multitudinous, although much information was received. Finally they were referred back to the committee on constitution and by-laws.

The proposed changes in the registration were that all candidates for initiation, no matter what the amount of the beneficiary certificate, pay a fee of 50 cents. It was pointed out that this would materially affect the revenue, and upon resolution it was decided to retain the former fee of 50 cents per \$500, \$1 for \$1,000 and \$1.50 per \$1,500.

For slight changes were made regarding the disability claims. However should a member become permanently disabled, he may draw four-fifths of the total amount for which he is insured.

For a number of years the members of grand lodge have had under discussion the advisability of making the sick benefit fund optional. Judging from the opinions expressed yesterday afternoon, it will be made optional.

This is one of the most critical questions before the grand body, as so many side issues presented themselves.
