Grand Lodge Discusses Changes in the Constitution.

Hamilton, Ont., June 21.—The grand lodge resumed its labors yesterday, Grand Master Clarke in the chair. The discussion of the proposed changes of the constitution was continued. The age limit was reduced from 49 to 45. The clauses relating to hazardous risks was under discussion for a considerable time. The defini-tions given of what might be hazarwere varied and multitudinous, although much information was received. Finally they were referred back to the committee on constitution

and bylaws. The proposed changes in the registration were that all candidates for initiation, no matter what the amount of the beneficiary certificate, pay a fee of 50 cents. It was pointed out that this would materially affect the revenue, and upon resolution it was decided to retain the former fee of 50 cents per \$500, \$1 for \$1,000 and \$1 50 per \$1.500.

But slight changes were made regarding the disability claims. How-ever should a member become perma-nently disabled, he may draw fourfifths of the total amount for which he is insured.

For a number of years the members of grand lodge have had under discussion the advisability of making the sick benefit fund optional. Judging from the opinions expressed yesterday afternoon, it will be made This is one of the most critical questions before the grand body, as \$0 many side issues presented themselves.
