CHICAGO, Ill., April 28.—It is announced to-night that Mrs. Potter Palmer will drive a golden nail in the woman's building at the World's Fair tomorrow afternoon to signify the completion of the building. Mrs. Eliza Richards, of Montana, will deliver the precious nail in a silver casket, and also a gold and silver hammer and Mrs. Palmer will thereupon proceed to finish the woman's building herself. As a matter of fact the golden nail will be immediately withdrawn and returned to its place in the breast pin of which it forms a part, and the pin will be presented to Mrs. Palmer.

This was a gala day at the World's Fair Turkish village, where several thousand red-tipped and gorgeously attired Turks and Americans gathered to assist in dedicating the Turkish mosque.

THE TORNADO'S TRACK.

Frighful Scene of Desolation in Oklahoma—The Ghostly Death Bell.

GUTHRIE, O. T., April 28.—The total number of persons who met death in Tuesday night's storm now reaches 90, and the injured number about 250, about 10 per cent of them fatally. One of the greatest scenes of desolation in the devastated district is at the home of John Mullenix, Payne county. The large barn and other buildings are completely gone, and the farm is stripped of every vestige of fences, crops and orchards.

Mr. Mullenix is fatally injured. Mrs. Mullenix just given birth to a child, and she was carried a mile and lay all night on the rain-soaked ground. She is alive, but will die. Her mother, Mrs. Oliver, and her brother, Davis Oliver, were both killed, as was her 10-year-old son. The babe that had just arrived in the world, however, survived its rough reception, and bids fair to live.

No Coercion for Newfoundland.

St. Johns, Nfld., April 28.—The British Government has agreed to accept the proposal of the Newfoundland Legislature for the settlement of the French shore question. The Gladstone Government will not reintroduce the obnoxious Coercion Bill into the Imperial Parliament, but requests the Newfoundland Legislature to continue the temporary act of 1891 until a measure satisfactory to both countries is passed.

Business Bad.

NEW YORK, April 28.—Bradstreet's says general business this week has been affected unfavorably, exceptions being so rare as to make them conspicuous. Mercantile failures still incline to increase, and it is noticeable that liabilities in some instances are heavier than reported for a long time. Failures in the United States number 186 against 217 last week and 147 in the first week of April, 1892. Mercantile failures in Canada number 35 this week, against 31 last week and 19 in the week on year ago.

Private Members' Day in the House.

Misstatements in Report to Mr. Martor's Bill Corrected.

[Special Dispatch to the ADVERTISER.]
TORONTO, April 28.—This being private members' day, the business done by the House was of rather an unimportant character, as no matters of particular moment came up.

Before the orders of the day were read the Commissioner of Public Works drew attention to the statements in the Toronto Mail and the Toronto Star that the Martor motion regarding prohibition had been shelved by the Government. Mr. Fraser said that the Government had no desire to shirk a division of the question, but Mr. Clancy, a member of the Opposition, had brought up his motion regarding the payment of living allowances to members of public institutions. By the rules of the House the matter had to be discussed, and the debate on it was proceeded with.

The House then took up the consideration of several unimportant motions.

The following private bills passed committee of the whole:

Mr. Hartly—Respecting burying grounds in the city of Kingston.

Mr. Ross—To confer certain powers on the town of Stratford.

Mr. Bronson—To amend the act respecting St. Andrew's Church, Ottawa.

Mr. Hartly—Respecting the School of Mining and Agriculture.
