on labels. It denounced a certain company for making cigars by child labor

the various plants of the company.

The committee reported the resolution
back with the recommendation that the back with the recommendation that the word "machinery" be stricken out, and the resolution was adopted. Then the cigarmakers opened their fight. The discussion promised to be very lengthy, but the moving of the previous question quickly ended the debate, and the resolution with the word "machinery" stricken

on resolutions reported a number of resolutions, which were adopted in every instance where the committees brought in a favorable recommendation.
This resolution also was adopted: Petitioning congress to amend the marine laws so that every seaman shall have the right to quit any merchant vessel on

tion, with the word "machinery" stricken out, was adopted as recommended. The committee on labels and the committee

right to quit any merchant vessel on which the service has become obnoxious to him; also to prohibit the towing on the ocean of gigantic rafts.

The committee on labels reported the following resolutions, which were adopted by the convention: That the federation refuse to recognize labels gotten up by rival unions of the Tobacco Workers' International Union; reindorsing the blue label of the Tobacco Workers' Union; that the federation draw up a form of obligation that will instruct all new members to demand the union label wherever they purchase manufactured wherever they purchase manufactured

wherever they purchase manufactured goods; indorsing the union stamp of the International Union of Journeymen Horseshoers, and indorsing the label of the Actors' National Protective Union. The Metal Trades Association, after a series of meetings, finally organized today by electing officers as follows: President, E. J. Lynch, New York, national president of the metal polishers; vice-president, Robert Kerr, Moline, N. Y., national president of the blacksmiths; secretary-treasurer, John O'Leary, Worcester, Mass., president of the coremakers.

WHERE STRIKE IS MISDEMEANOR. Sydney, N. S. W., Dec. 10.—A strike or a lockout is made a misdemeanor by a bill just passed. All disputes between employers and employes are to be settled by a court which have nower to enforce by a court which has power to enforce its findings.
