TREVELYAN'S NEW JOB.

HARD LUCK TALE OF RACE HORSE

Was Beaten by a Head When \$10,000 Against \$50 Was Depending On Him.

"Talking of hard luck stories," said an eastern trainer at New Orleans recently, "I can spin you a yarn, and it is not a hard luck, either. Last spring I saw a colt that I thought might be a prospect, and I bought him for \$500. He was royally bred, and a tough, wiry customer. 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DYNAMITE AT A DANCE

Five Hundred Dancers in Mad Panic, Many Seriously Hurt.

Woodbridge, N. There were 500 people in the hall, and they became panic-stricken and fought to get out, many being trampled on and seriously injured. Galaldi was burned about the head and his wife became unconscious. Gertrude Elton had one eye destroyed, her nose broken and her jaw dislocated. Michael Ponger had his right arm torn off at the elbow. Dynamite used by some aggrieved person is believed to have caused the explosion.

DESTROYED BY FIRE

The Windsor Methodist Church Burned Down.

Windsor, Ont., Jan. 5.—Lack of water pressure and equipment baffled the Windsor fire department in its attempt to save the old Windsor Avenue Methodist Church at Windsor avenue and Chatham street, which was a wooden building, yesterday morning, only the brick walls and massive towers remaining when the flames had died out for lack of fuel. The destroyed building was erected in 1873, and its value is placed at about \$25,000, including the \$2,000 organ and contents. The insurance is \$15,000, and this will barely pay the debt of \$13,000 on the property. The congregation is practically no better off financially than it was when the church was built 30 years ago. The work of raising money to rebuild will begin at once, according to the trustees.

FROZEN TO DEATH

Three Boys Caught in Blizzard Succumb to Cold.

Bay Port, Mich., Jan. 5.—Jay Loundsberry, aged 11; Glen Loundsberry, aged 9, and Dan Dutcher, aged 11, wandered out on Wild Wolf Bay on Saturday forenoon, about 10 o'clock, intending to visit the fishing shanties that dot the bay three miles from shore. Finding the shanties locked, they started to return home, and were overtaken by one of the severest blizzards that this section has ever known. Their way was waywardly aimless around, their tracks showing them to have been at one time about 100 feet from the shore, and then they traveled toward Heisterman's Island, going only a short way before they succumbed to the cold. Searching parties did not find them until 8 o'clock Sunday morning. The two Loundsberry boys were lying close together, frozen stiff, the Dutcher boy about ten rods away.
