At a private meeting of the Crosby Hall preservation committee at the Guildhall on Tuesday the announcement was made that an anonymous donor had guaranteed a sum of £20,000. Of the £60,000 required for its preservation £46,000 is promised.

The Vicar of Leeds remarked at the Ripon Diocesan Conference, on Tuesday, that there ought to be more palaces for bishops. "A more modest house would meet the case," he added, "and would make much of the present expenditure needless."

Suicide during temporary insanity through pain was the verdict returned on Tuesday at Shoreditch at an inquest on Elizabeth White, late of Murray street, Hoxton. Having suffered greatly from rheumatism she hanged herself to her bedrail.

Alderman Wood, mayor-elect of High Wycombe, went to the assistance of a policeman who was overpowered by a drunken laborer named Rackstraw, and blew the officer's whistle. The bench on Tuesday sent the prisoner to jail for three weeks' hard labor.

Mr. Jesse Collins, M. P., told the Birmingham Chamber of Commerce on Tuesday that old-age pensions were bound to come. He would not only give a pension though, but would pin on the man's breast a medal as being a worthy soldier of trade and commerce.

Some bullocks were panic-stricken by the brilliant rays of the acetylene gas lamp of the Rev. G. Kendall, of Horncastle, Lincolnshire, who was cycling to Bardney. One animal attacked him with his horns, but the force of the blow was diverted by a thankful friend, a collection box, which Mr. Kendall had in his pocket.

At Lindfield on Tuesday a cyclist named Reginald Burtenshaw was descending a hill when he collided with a motor car and crashed through the glass screen. He was taken to the Haywards Heath Cottage Hospital in a precarious condition. It was found necessary to put over 50 stitches in his face and scalp.

The story of a would-be suicide being haunted by a sin of his childhood was related at King's Lynn on Tuesday. James Bullen, a shoemaker and postman, attempted to hang himself, and wrote a note explaining that he began to practice deceit at the age of six. The bench discharged him.

It was stated at Bristol police court

on Tuesday, when G. Lyons Press, a ship's carpenter, was committed for trial for attempted murder, that he had felled his wife with a hatchet, when his daughter, interposed, and received several fearful blows that otherwise would have reached her mother.

PAY OR BE JAILED

American Actors in England Must Pay an Income Tax.

New York, Nov. 12.—According to a London dispatch, the American members of the company playing "Mrs. Wiggs of the Cabbage Patch" discovered last night that the British Government does not permit Americans to take money out of the country without paying an income tax.

All the members of the company received a notice from the tax collector that they were liable for their income tax for the six months they have been playing in London. The company, which is booked for a long tour in the provinces, thought at first the notice was a bluff, and rushed to the American consulate to discover whether they would be compelled to pay.

Consul-General Wynne told them they would have to pay or go to jail.

A ROMANCE OF MEDICINE

Grateful for Relief Rich Woman Gives Doctor a Start.

Paris, Nov. 11.—One of the best equipped hospitals in Paris, built and furnished throughout by Mrs. W. K. Vanderbilt, shortly will be opened. The physician in charge will be Dr. Georges Gautier, whose rise to wealth and influence is one of the romances of the medical profession.

Three years ago Gautier was little known. One day he received a visit from Mrs. Vanderbilt, who was suffering from facial neuralgia. She had been recommended by a friend to follow his electrical treatment. The cure was rapid and complete, and a few days after the case was dismissed Gautier was authorized to receive a check for \$2,000. Thinking it a mistake, he called on Mrs. Vanderbilt and said the check was a hundred times too large. FEDERATION GROWS SAYS GOMPERS

Labor Union President Delivers Annual Report to Washington Convention.

Norfolk, Va., Nov. 12.—President Gompers, in his annual report to the American Federation of Labor, calls attention to the growth of the organization during the year, which, he says, has been one of the busiest in its life.

Every effort will be made during the coming year to organize the unorganized all over the country. The effort begun last year by President Gompers to bring the Western Federation of Miners into the A. F. of L., will be renewed.

"No reduction in wages," is still the watchword. This policy, Mr. Gompers says, has had a good effect on industry, and at no time has it had a greater effectiveness than during the recent weeks of financial stringency.

Mr. Gompers declares that the laws of supply and demand had a place in nature and in primitive conditions, but with the onward rush of science, man has made nature conform to his wants, and the original conception of supply and demand has been overcome.

He asks for the abolition of child labor; the organization of women workers, and for further spread of the eight-hour work day. He remarks that the recent commercial telegraphers' strike was inopportune. He says that he advised the officers of the organization in advance of the impracticability of the strike.

Farmers in the Southern and Western States are organizing, pledging to give their patronage to the products of union labor.

The law reducing the hours of labor for men working on the railroads is a step, but it is not satisfactory. Referring to the labor movement in Canada, Mr. Gompers said: It has been our purpose to aid and assist to the fullest extent of our movement our Canadian fellow-workmen. In the transaction of our affairs we have regarded them as being part and parcel of the American labor movement as much as our movement is part and

parcel of theirs. Geographical lines have in no way interfered with the fullest development of fraternal relations.

Ignorant or prejudiced opposition to the beneficent work of the labor movement finds its counterpart in Canada as it does here. In Canada an expression of that feeling was illustrated in a bill by Senator Loughhead, the purpose of which was to make it a criminal act for any person not a Canadian or a British subject to "incite workmen to go out on strike in Canada."

Of course, it is well known to those who participate in our movement and others who are not hostile, that as a matter of fact our unions, our officers and our representatives do not "incite" workmen to go on strike either in the United States or in Canada; that strikes are entered into by workmen of their own volition after they themselves have determined upon that action, and when no other recourse is open.

The men of labor in Canada have as much right to conduct their own affairs as have any members of organized labor in the United States.

It is not difficult, however, to discern that if such a law as Senator Loughhead proposed were possible of enactment any aid which the labor men of Canada might ask of the United States trade unionists to go there and give would be construed as an act to "incite" other workmen in Canada to go out on strike.

Organized labor in Canada, true to its own interests and to the welfare of all the people of the Dominion, as well as justice toward the labor movement of the United States, protested so emphatically that Senator Loughhead's bill was killed by an overwhelming majority in the senate, and hence did not reach the House.

Secretary Morrison, in his report says the Federation has just completed the most successful year since its organization in 1881. The strike fund totals \$138,078 88. During the year 373 charters have been granted. There are now 72 central bodies for 1,723 federal unions.

In the year there were 1,432 strikes, involving 130,371 men. The strikes cost \$3,050,359 24. Of this number 4,071 of the strikes were successful; 68 men were compromised; 124 lost. Of the men involved, 93,225 were benefited. The voting strength of the federation has grown from 2,747 in 1897, to 16,419.

The paid membership of the federation is 1,538,970. This is a gain of 1,274,155 over the membership of 1897. Treasurer Lennon reports that the total funds now in his hands are \$127,919 93.

CLEVELAND MURDER MYSTERY.

Cleveland, Ohio, Nov. 11.—After numerous postponements of the trial, Mrs. Charlotte Phillips finally appeared before Justice Brown in East Cleveland today to answer to the charge of second degree murder, in causing the death of her husband, J. J. Phillips, a coal operator. Phillips was shot early on the morning of Sept. 2 last. According to Mrs. Phillips her husband was killed by a burglar.
