Engineer's Figures.

Engineer Moore had inspected the section previously with Engineer Maury, and had measured about 500,-000 gallons daily. A large quantity could in his opinion be developed. The commissioners thought that a million gallons could be easily developed. There were times when Mr. Moore's estimate would be doubled in a steady flow, but 500,000 was all that could be depended upon, he said.
