Reid waved to Cade to stop Kraft, but the latter turned and went into McLean's lumber yard, after throwing away his gun. He was captured while trying to hide in a pile of posts. Kraft's revolver was a 38calibre gun, firing five shots. When the officers were shot he was alone in the office with the three men. Lister was searching him and had emptied three pockets. Sergt. Reid was writing down the description, and Quamby was sitting in a chair at the end of the desk, reading a paper. The first bullet struck him.

It is not thought that any of the men wounded are dangerously hurt, although the bullet is still in Quamby's shoulder. Sergt, Reid lives at 70 Caron avenue; Lister at 166 Goyeau street, and has been on the police force for 28 years. Quamby resides at 35 Aylmer avenue, and was for 27 years a member of the fire department before he became janitor of the city

Predicts Earthquake for Quebec Province

Boston, Mass., May 7.—Dr. Eunice D. Kinney, known far and wide as an earthquake expert, and whose predictions are even accepted by scientists as worthy of consideration, declares that Lower Canada will tomorrow or Sunday, at the latest, be shaken by a seismic disturbance.

"The coming of the disturbance," said Dr. Kinney, "is manifest by a peculiar appearance in the skies. The sky is heavy, as it was at the time of the San Francisco earthquake. The emanations from the ground cast a shadow on the horizon, which I have been studying for the past twelve hours. As near as I can figure the shock will come some time Saturday or Sunday morning, and it will be in Lower Canada." Dr. Kinney is the woman who became famous through pre-

dicting disturbances of the earth, and for 25 years has accurately foretold earthquakes, including the San Francisco and "I dislike to create alarm needlessly," says Dr. Kinney, "yet when I know that the shocks are coming I feel it my duty to speak."
