GRAFT INVESTIGATIONS

Thorough Inquiry.

[Special to The Advertiser.] Woodstock, Nov. 24.—There were no developments in the Oxford graft investigation this morning. Judge Sny der, George T. Blackstock and Mr. Cameron will hold a consultation this afternoon in Toronto to decide on course of action. Some cases, in which complete evidence has been obtained, will likely be heard first, and in two of these the witnesses are close to the ity and can be got at any time.

The transactions to be gone into cover over a dozen years, and many witnesses who would have been most valuable in disclosing the truth have died or left for parts unknown.

This investigation was partly gone into before County Judge about eighteen months ago, but nothing then came of it. The present ounty council resolved to find out the truth, and got a promise from Premier Whitney that if they gathered together sufficient evidence to justify it the Government would issue a royal commission and pay all expenses, with the exception of a solicitor to prepare the evidence to be put before the attorney-general when deciding on the wisdom of issuing a commission.

How many are implicated in the alleged crooked dealings is not known, but a keen desire is abroad that punishment shall be meted out to all the guilty.
