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GENERAL ASSEMBLY COMES TO AN END

Last Session Occupied With
Missions and College
Reports.

THE BUDGET WAS PASSED

New District Supervisors Appointed
to Complete the Enlarged
Number.

Edmonton, June 13.—The General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church finished its work here shortly before 7 o'clock tonight. The home and foreign mission committee finished their reports, and there was a general discussion of college work, some of the western colleges having matters to introduce.

The home mission committee was charged with their responsibility of naming ten district superintendents for the work of supervision. A number of these were, however, appointments. New names were those of Rev. J. V. Tanner, for the Synod of Montreal and Ottawa, and Rev. J. T. Ferguson, for Western Alberta. Two positions were left for the present unfilled, the appointments to be made later by the home mission committee. The budget for 1913 was again discussed, and it was unanimously decided to accept the report of the committee. This fixes the amount to be secured for the year 1913 at \$1,200,000. In connection with the discussion of the work in the colleges, a request was presented for authority to organize a new college at Saskatoon, and this was given without a dissenting voice.

Two Overtures.

After 6 o'clock two important overtures were introduced. Judge Swanson brought one from British Columbia. He stated that in that province ministers were troubled in the matter of the remarriage of persons who had secured divorces in the United States. He asked that the assembly be given instructions in these cases. A representative was also introduced from the Maritime Provinces asking for greater strictness in connection with the theological standards of the church. It was suggested that there was laxity in the colleges. Committees were named to take both these overtures under advisement and report to the next assembly.

During the morning a resolution consolidating the monies of the aged and infirm ministers' fund was passed. The important matter of the appointment of district superintendents was taken up and finally reported as follows:

8. Calgary, Lacombe and Red Deer, Rev. Wm. Shearer.
9. MacLeod, High River and Kootenay, Rev. J. T. Ferguson.
10. Kamloops, Westminster and Victoria, Rev. Dr. C. A. Wilson.

The Budget.

In the afternoon Principal Gandler presented the amended budget, the total of which now amounts to the sum of \$1,200,000 for missions. This total is made up, as follows: Home missions, \$425,000; foreign missions, \$325,000; augmentation, \$120,000; French evangelism, \$35,000; Point Aux Trembles schools, \$24,000; Montreal College, \$12,000; Queen's College, \$8,000; Knox College, \$23,000; Man-

toba College, \$12,500; Rolfertson College, \$10,000; Westminster Hall, \$18,600; Deaconesses' Training Home, \$5,000; social service and evangelism, \$8,000; Jewish work, \$12,000; aged and infirm ministers, \$25,000; widows and orphans, \$25,000; assembly fund, \$39,000; not allocated, \$9,500.

A long discussion arose with reference to the matter of the insertion in the budget of the sum to cover the cost of the annual meeting of the assembly. It was finally decided, however, to insert the full amount which is intended to cover the travelling expenses of the 500 commissioners and the other incidental expenses of the gathering.

THEOLOGICAL STUDENTS ADMIT DISHONESTY

According to Toronto Paper
They Cheated at the Spring
Examinations.

Toronto, June 13.—The News this evening states that a sensation was sprung in the ministerial session of the Toronto Conference of the Methodist Church yesterday, when the reports of the results of the spring examinations at Victoria University were being presented.

According to the story which the News claims is garnered from an authentic source, one of the students arose and accused another of dishonesty in the theological examinations. The accused student was summoned, but by a mistake the wrong man was brought in. To the surprise of the ministers he confessed his guilt, and when the other who had been accused was also questioned, he, too, admitted having been guilty of dishonesty. Both were debarred from writing on examinations for the next two years, although they will be allowed to continue their studies.

This is said to be the first time in thirty years that the Toronto Conference has disciplined members for this reason. The last occasion was when a noted Greek student was disciplined for giving assistance to another student.

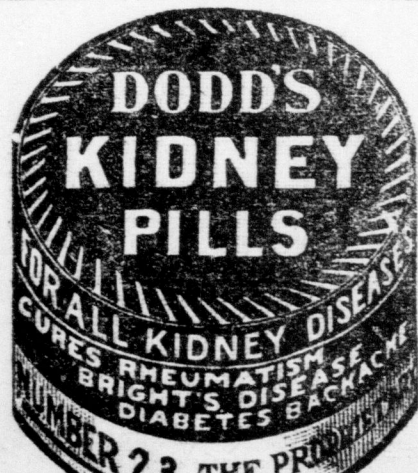
