TORONTOS WON

N. H. A. Championship Winners Again Defeat Victorias.

FINAL SCORE WAS 6 TO 5

McGiffin Scored Winning Goal After Fifteen Minutes of Extra Play.

Toronto, March 17 .- The Torontos hampions of the National Hockey Association, and Victoria, holders of the Pacific Coast League title, played their second Stanley Cup game at the Arena here tonight. The locals again demonstrated their superiority over the western visitors, but it required fifteen minutes of overtime play to do the trick.

The score was 6 to 5. The game was played under Pacific coast League rules. These call for seven nen on each team, and the loss of the services of a player when penalized. Another and important feature was the new off-side rule in centre ice, which was shown to local fans for the first time The Victorias had an advantage here and frequently caught the local's forwards off their guard by long passes to another player up the ice. They did not, however, have the fast snappy passes of the visitors, who showed that they have perfected the play.

The visitors again lacked the punch to get goals, even though they did score five. Most of their tallies were scored when Torontos were short a player, while the locals touched the majority of theirs while the entire Victoria team was in position. In the last period, Victoria had many good chances with only one man to pass, but preferred to shoot from outside the defence. Dunderdale was the worst offender in this respect. Holmes. who is generally weak on long shots, was not caught napping tonight. McGiffin Scores Winning Goal.
