#### TODAY'S LENTEN DISH

Baked Mackerel .- The fresh fish is best for this recipe, but the salted fish may be used, if soaked in tepid water until all salt has been removed. Cu off head and tail from fish weighing 11/2 pounds and remove the backbone. Place the fish in baking pan, skin side down and sprinkle it with a little curry powder. Blend one tablespoonful of Worcestershire sauce and spread over
