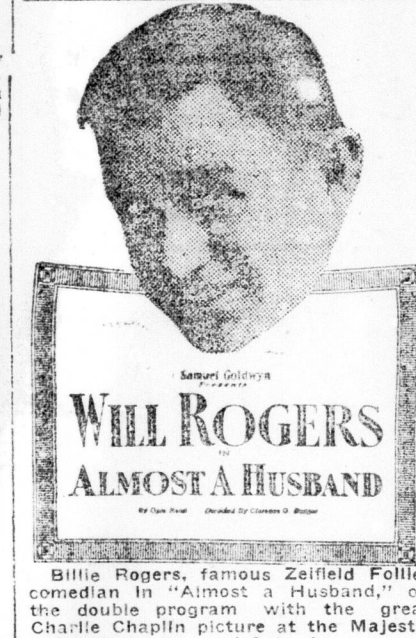
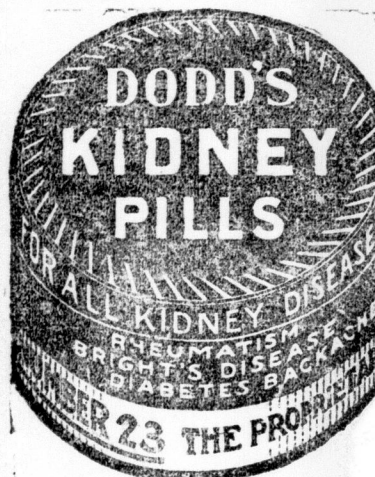

## ITALIAN COLONIAL ORGANIZATION

Rome, Tuesday, Dec. 16.—The Italian colonial institute, presided over by Senator Artoni, is promoting the constitution of a permanent organization in Rome to represent all of the Italian colonies abroad, with the view of discussing questions affecting their internal interests. It is proposed to have two branches of the organization to be designated by the different Italian colonies, and appointed by the colonial institute. The first branch will be divided into sections, each specializing in certain problems affecting the colonies.

## SMALLPOX SITUATION IMPROVES

Toronto, Dec. 17.—According to the records at the city hall today there is a slight improvement today in the smallpox situation. Thirty-nine new cases were reported, and 43 discharged as cured. There are now here under treatment 751 cases and 1,801 persons are quarantined.

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
