The Board of Education Will Charge for Use of Schools.

For the purpose of asking the board of education to insert in future build-ing contracts a fair wage clause, a deputation from the Trades and Labor Council waited on No. 2 committee of the board of education at Tuesday's meeting.

The deputation, headed by Mr. Hessel told of complaints made by laborers to the effect that they were not receiving a fair wage from contractors who were working on city contracts. Chairman Hayman remarked that he believed that the contractors were doing their best, and that they were paying a fair wage. The deputation, however, was assured that its request would be granted. Seven or eight years ago such a resolution was passed, but it is not believed that Youngs was ever put into operation by the board.






