New York, Sept. 21.—Managers of major league teams are looking everywhere for good catchers to strengther their clubs for next season, because there appears to be general agreement among them that the back-stopping has not been so good this year. With such stars as Ray Schalk of the White Sox and Wally Schang showing signs of slipping, it would seem to be time for the majors to turn up some promising new catcher material. Hargrave of the Cincinnati Reds stands out above all other catchers in both leagues for the merit of his performance this year.

He has been steady behind the bat, and his hitting has been timely and hard. Part of the lack of class of some of the teams this year has been due to the catching, which has been as bad as the pitching. Perhaps the catchers have been responsible for the poor showing made by some of the pitchers. Schalk is still a wenderful catcher, but imagine a backstopper going into 113 games for a major league club and batting only .220. With weak-hitting pitchers and a catcher with no better success than that as a batter, the White Sox have a hole at the bottom of their patting order like one of those chasms left by the Japanese carthquake.

This year he is not even batting well. Hoffman, the Yankees' second-string catcher, can hit quite a lot; but he should spend all winter throwing at a roark and trying to get the ball away. Fingough, another kid on the New York team, comes so near to being the best throwing catcher in baseball that anyone who thinks he has it over him will have to make six bullseyes in succession. Bengough is one of those delectable throwers who can line the ball over the ground with so little effort that it does not seem as though he threw.

If Bengough were a strong batter, which he is not, he would verge on being the greatest catching star in the game.
