Washington, Aug. 13.—Evidence that the Belmont-Morgan bond syndicate intend to protect the gold reserve of the Treasury against raids upon it for export to Europe was received at the Treasury Department by Acting Secretary Curtis this afternoon. A telegram from Acting Assistant Treasurer Muhlman reached him, stating that J. P. Morgan & Co. had deposited \$1,346,000 in gold coin at the New York sub-treasury in exchange for United States notes. A previous telegram to the department contained the information that \$900,000 in gold coin had been withdrawn from the sub-treasury for export to-morrow. coin had been withdrawn from the sub-treasury for export to-morrow. With the deposit of gold to-day by the syndicate their total deposits since gold exports have been resemed on a large scale amount to \$3,346,000. It a large scale amount to \$3,346,000. It is estimated here that with exchange at 490 1-2 to 490 3-4, a net profit of \$3000 on each \$1,000,000 gold exported is made by the shippers. Treasury officials are much gratified at the action of the syndicate, as it is construed to mean that they will not permit the gold reserve to fall below \$100,000,000. At the close of business to-day the reserve stood at \$101,933, 715.

The commission is composed of the British and American Consuls at Foo-Chow and several missionaries.

O'Connor, the British Minister, calling on the Governors of the provinces to take precautions that the people are not missied by rumors exciting them against the missionaries.
