At the recent Assizes in Northumberland, a man named Ralph Joicy was convicted (on the 27th of February) of the murder of his father by poison.-After his conviction he was sent, back to the gaol of Morpeth, and he was condemned to be executed at that place, on Wednesday the 18th inst. On the arrival of the prisoner at Morpeth, the Hon. Rev. Francis Grey, Rector of the parish caused to be printed and circulated among his flock-

"A Form of intercession in behalf of Ralph Joicy, confined in Morpeth Gaol, under sentence of death, Prefixed was a recommendation that-

"These prayers be said in the parish Church, which will be open for the purpose every day between the hours of 12 and 1."

Many complied with the recommendation, and went up daily to the temple. There was also a much larger attendance than usual at the daily service (which is always said in Morpeth church). On the morning of the execution, the scene at the church was, we understand, of the most solemn, affecting, and edifying character.

"'Twas silence in Thy Temple Lord, When slowly through the hallow'd air, The spreading cloud of incense soar'd, Charg'd with the breath of Israel's Prayer."
